MRS. ROOSEVELT VISITS GILA; SAYS RELOCATE LOYAL NISEI

Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt, who visited the Gila River and Roy Himoto, for Rock-Project, stated in a press conference at Los Angeles that trusted American-born Japanese should be given jobs outside relocation centers and the sooner the better, according to an Associated Press report of Tuesday.

"Of course the citizens should be checked care-fully, but then I think they should be put to work at relocation where they are welcomed and where government officials are willing they should be."

She was of the opinion that the sooner the young Japanese were released from camps the better.

Mrs. Roosevelt's comment followed a visit to the Gila River Project. She said the evacuees there made no complaints, asked no favors, save one, a ventilator to cool the barracks this summer for the benefit of some of the residents who are ill.
