PROJECT LOSES 28 CARLOADS OF COAL AS RESULT OF AN EMBARGO

Bank Notice

The Bank of American service will not be available on Tuesday, May 4. The bank will be opened on May 6.

For those wishing to cash checks on Tuesday, the Co-op's check cashing service will be open. made immediately to obtain positions for them in the type of work they desire.

As a result of an embargo on the shipment of coal to this project, Tule Lake loses 28 carloads of coal and the possibility of six more now on the railway siding, it was announced.

Tule Lake will not be the only project affected by this embargo, as it is nation-wide.

A telegram received on Saturday morning is as follows:

Families Of Soldiers May Get Aid

Wives and children of soldiers in the United States Army leaving Tule Lake Project may receive cash grants to meet early living and transportation expenses, it was learned today. Grants are available if indefinite leave has been issued the family, regardless of whether any member is planning to work outside the center.

The maximum grant made by WRA covers coach fare, plus fifty dollars (\$50) for the head of the group going out and a maximum of \$50 for two or more dependents.

To be eligible for a cash grant, an evacuee must be in need of financial assistance in order to reach his destination and to cover initial living expenses.

Applications are received at the project leave office and should be accompanied by a statement showing cash on hand and

income for the last six months.

To receive this aid, it is not necessary for the whole family to leave the project together, but only one person in the same family may receive the \$50 allowance for living expenses. The other members, up to two, may receive a maximum of \$25 apiece.

500 WORKERS STILL NEEDED BY AMALGAMATED SUGAR CO.

The Southern Idaho-Eastern Oregon section still needs approximately 500 workers for field work, stated Mr. Marsing, representative of the Amalgamated Sugar Company.

The first and most pressing job is the sugar beet thinning. Later in the season there will be ample work for all available laborers in the harvest of potatoes, onions, lettuce, fruit and vegetable seed crops.

Mr. Marsing who is recruiting for this area will remain in camp as long as reasonable numbers can be recruited but he states that if the necessary workers can not be obtained here he will move to other centers.
