RESETTLERS APPLY AT LEAVE OFFICE FOR FINANCIAL AID

Effective Friday, May 7, all applications for financial assistance by evacuees leaving the Project for indefinite employment should be made at the Leave Office instead of at the Social Welfare Department, C.R. Carter, assoc. chief of Community Services, reported yesterday.

AUDITOR HERE

Mr. Murir, an auditor, arrived on May 3, for three weeks from Washington D.C. to clarify the new system of accounting at the Administration building.

JOB LISTS ARE POSTED

Lists of outside employment offers will be posted at block manager's offices and messhalls throughout the Project beginning today, Frank D. Fagan, Placement officer, stated.

All offers received to date that have not been filled are on the bulletin board in the Placement office at 1208. Complete information and interviewers are also available there.

Frank Fagan per-

sonally is "open for interviews at all times" and urges people to see him whenever confronted with problems relative to employment.

U.S.E.S. Cannot Handle Midwest Work Inquiries

The United States Employment Service advises that they cannot handle inquiries made by a good many of the evacuees in relocation centers who write or telegraph local offices of the U.S. Employment Service in mid-western cities asking whether there are employment openings in various specific lines of work, according to a report from the Director of the WRA to the Project Director.

It is requested that the evacuees send such inquiries to the relocation officers of the WRA.

TREASURY REPORT MADE AT CO-OP ASSEMBLY

At a third general assembly of the local Co-op, complete reports were given of the various departments.

The treasurer's report revealed an accumulated net saving from May 28, 1942 to November 30, 1942 of \$37,886.03

and a net saving between December 1, 1942 to March 31, 1943 of \$47,807.49. This makes a total of \$85,993.52, which is the unallocated net savings of the Co-op. This includes fixed assets such as equipment, etc.

The unallocated net savings is subject to patronage refund after:

1. Income taxes have been paid upon the basis of the recorded patronage.

2. General surplus reserve has been set aside.

3. Educational fund has been set aside.

COAL SITUATION

On Saturday, May 1 there was published in the Tulean Dispatch, at my request, a message to the residents of this center regarding the coal situation in general and the necessity for community action on the part of the colonists to see that coal delivered to this project is unloaded.

Since that time a number of volunteer groups have been organized and have made substantial contributions to the immediate problem of unloading coal on hand. These groups are to be highly commended. They have shown a spirit of unselfishness and interest in community welfare that is deserving of high compliment.

Nevertheless, I cannot feel that such efforts are the real answer to the problem because as a rule they represent the sentiments of only a few blocks or a

few community spirited leaders.

The final answer will not be found until the whole population comes to the conclusion that they cannot have security in this project unless and until they can count on the prompt and faithful performance of a coal crew which is dedicated to its work with the same high purpose as inspires the firemen and Internal Security wardens.

The administration will do everything possible to assist in the formation of such a work group within the limits of WRA policies and procedures. It is squarely up to the community, however, to create an atmosphere in which such a crew can be formed and can function in the way that this community requires.

SHOE REPAIR SHOP REOPENS; NEW POLICIES ANNOUNCED

After a complete investigation of the one week's closing of the Shoe Repair Shop, the Management Committee of the Co-op and the shoe repairmen found that the move was justified, according to Noboru Honda, Director of Information.

The committee reported that the repairmen worked very incessantly under adverse conditions with the sincere welfare of the colonists at heart.

Details of the incident will be announced in each block, it was added.

The following new policies are in effect since the reopening of the shop on May 3rd:

1. No additional shoes will be accepted for repair until May 15th. All shoes in the shop at the present time will be repaired by the 15th to completely repair the shoes on hand. The residents who have their shoes at the shops now are requested to call for them by the 15th.

Tule Lake Area Proves To Be Good For "Mushroom Hunting"

The old Japanese custom of mushroom hunting struck the colonists like news of a gold strike, when an abundant growth of edible mushroom was discovered growing on the farm around the camp area.

It was reported that residents have been bringing back sacfuls of these delicacies.

Through reliable sources, it was learned that Tule Lake area is one of the best mushroom paradise in California.

All mushrooms in this vicinity are edible and are not of the poison variety.

There are three different varieties of edible fungi. The pink gill type found mostly in the grazing areas; the cream colored "Ya-nagi Na-ba" type found in bunches around tree trunks and stumps; a cream colored "soft ball" shaped fungi, found abundantly in the vicinity of the farm ar-

REPORT MADE ON EVACUEES RESETTLEMENT IN CHICAGO

The experience of approximately 270 evacuees in resettling in Chicago formed the basis of report issued by the Advisory Committee for Evacuees.

The report was made so that all those planning to leave for Chicago may have some information beforehand.

Over three-fourth of evacuees coming to Chicago in March arrived without jobs in advance. It took 10 to 15 days on the average to secure employment. Earnings vary according to individuals and skills.

Regarding housing situation, it was reported that it takes twice as long to find adequate housing as it does to get a job.

Rents are higher in wartime Chicago, and housing on the whole is not as good as evacuees who come here expect it to be.

Rents that early evacuees are paying are as follows: one room furnished apartments, \$3.50 to \$12 weekly; two to three-room furnished kit-chennette, \$30 to \$65 monthly; two to four-room furnished apartments, \$25 to \$55 monthly.

On the average, it is costing from \$1 to \$1.45 a day for hearty appetites to eat out three times a day.
