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## EVACUEES MAY ENROLL FOR NYA TRAINING

### 5 MEN MOVED FROM JAIL

The five men who had been in Modoc County Jail since February for attempted beating of an evacuee have just been transferred to an isolation center in Leupp, Arizona.

### WRA COMPLETES PLANS WITH FIVE REGIONAL DIRECTORS

Regional Directors in Denver, Kansas City, St. Paul, Chicago, and Cleveland whereby evacuees may enroll in the N.Y.A. resident centers for training leading to participation in war industries, it was announced by Elmer M. The reason stated was that Form 33 is now void. It was advised that this change be made without delay in order to receive property as soon as possible.

## Evacuees On Leave May Obtain Emergency Aid

Sugar beet workers and other persons on leave who are unable to pay for essential medical care or who need other emergency assistance while they are away from the center should go to the nearest local welfare bureau immediately, Project Leave Officer, Frank C. Smith declared today.

Special federal funds have been set aside to assist evacuees on leave and other groups who were forced to leave their homes as a wartime measure when they get into difficulties in their efforts to re-establish themselves. Aid to evacuees is administered by local welfare boards under an arrangement

## Procedure For Changing Repatriation Requests

Questions concerning what an evacuee should do when he has changed his mind on repatriation or expatriation are answered in new WRA instructions received at the center today, according to Project Director Harvey M. Coverley.

Persons who have asked to be repatriated, or who have indicated acceptance or declination of repatriation as a result of lists of names submitted by the Japanese government, may change their requests by filing the proper form with the Project Director. The War Relocation Authority cannot guarantee the exchange of evacuees applying for repatriation. It can only place the application in the hands of the State Department for consideration in the exchange negotiation.

In discussing the new instruction with the TRIBUNE DISPATCH Harvey M. Goverley said, "While each evacuee is free to decide for himself whether he wants to apply for exchange to Japan, the decision should not be arrived at hastily or lightly. The individual's choice in this matter may have far reaching consequence. It should be made only after carefully thought."

## SOFTBALL RULES

The following rules and regulations were approved by the softball managers:

1. Games will be played every Wednesday evening from 7 p.m. and Sunday afternoons from 2 p.m.

3. Mess workers may play with the team in the block which they are working.
