The War Relocation Authority cannot guaran-tee the exchange of evacues applying for reca-triation. It can only. place the application in the hands of the State.' Department for consideration in the exchange negotiation.

In discussing the new instruction with the TU-TEAN DISPATCH Harvey M. Coverley said, "While each evacuee is free to decide for himself whether he wants to apply for ex-change to Japan, the decision should not be arrived at hastily or lightly.
