SPECIAL STUDENTS SCHOOL TO OPEN MONDAY AT 7218

Because of the urgent requests from the handicapped children, the School for Special Students will open Monday, May 31, even though the school-room will not be fully equipped and arranged, it was revealed.

The school is

opening at 7218 and will remain at that location until a more suitable place is found.

The students themselves will help to plan the arrangement of the room, make some necessary equipment, and take inventory of supplies.

Poll Will Determine Sentiment On Evacuees

Whether or not communities in Oregon, Washington and California would be willing to employ interned Japanese considered loyal to the United States will be determined by questionnaires which are to be sent to organizations in the three states, a news story in the Oregonian disclosed.

The Portland Chamber of Commerce is undertaking the survey in Oregon. Composite reports from the three states will be submitted to congressional and administrative officials concerned with the government policy in handling the internees.

David B. Simpson, chamber president, said that all communities west of the mountains in the three states definitely are opposed to the return of the Japanese to the coastal areas.

On the eastern borders of Oregon and Washington, there is considerable opinion that the internees should be employed in the working of fields and harvesting of crops, he stated.

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DEWITT TO BE MOVED, REPORT

According to the May 27 issue of the San Francisco Examiner, Congressman Richard J. Welch said that Lieut. Gen. Delos Emmons is scheduled to succeed Lieut. Gen. J. L. DeWitt as commanding general of the Western Defense Command and Fourth Army soon.

General Emmons is commanding general of the Hawaii Defense Command.

It was added that General DeWitt is slated for a desk job in Washington, according to Congressman Welch.

ESTABLISHMENT OF WRA CENTERS MISTAKE—MYER

TO SPEED RESETTLEMENT

The government now recognizes that the establishment of relocation centers was a mistake, Dillon S. Myer, director of the War Relocation Authority, said last week, according to a United Press report.

In recognition of that fact, steps are being taken to free most of the 110,000 evacuees in such camps as rapidly as possible.

Myer said that in these camps administration has been

difficult, and that many loyal citizens have been embittered by what they consider unfair treatment.

He said American citizens who have signed loyalty pledge should be given an opportunity to reestablish themselves in American life as rapidly as possible. Most of them, he added, intend to remain in the United States after the war and generally are completely loyal.

LICENSE FOR MARRIAGE

Both parties must appear when applying and both must have health certificates.

ORDERS FOR ANNIVERSARY BOOK MAY BE PLACED NOW

"A Tule Lake Interlude", a book to be published by the DISPATCH in the observance of the Project's anniversary, should be ready by June 12.

The book will depict the drama in which all nisei were involved through the confusion of pre-evacuation days and a sketch of life in the Project.

Dr. Y. Ichihashi, former professor at Stanford University, guided the DISPATCH staff in gathering research materials.

Since limited copies will be published, reservations may be made at the DISPATCH office for ten cents. Those who are planning to relocate are urged to make reservations before they leave the Project. The price is to defray the expense of printing the cover and binding the books in Klamath Falls.

The judges, nationally known art critics, were unanimous in their decision.

The letter stated: "The judges marvelled at the effect you were able to produce in this new medium."

Artists from all the relocation centers submitted pictures depicting camp scenes for this art exhibit.

Ito Speaks On Placement Relocation Holds Party

In a farewell address before a YBA meeting Mer-jorie Ito, who left for Evanston recently emphasized that the greatest progress noted in the Project during the year is the relocation movement.

"The American youth of today," she said, "is confronted with the task of obtaining a job out of the many available to them."

She explained that for the nisei this task is not the same nor as simple since they are the product of two cultures.

"Though our hearts may say, 'I am an American', we must remember that our features are not the same and our strides quite so long. Broadminded people do not hold this against us, but we must remember that all people are not broadminded."

She cautioned the nisei not to go out with a self-conscious effort because the greatest advance in the world civilization has been made when two cultures were intermingled.

"A day will come," she declared, "when war headlines will have no place in our lives, or papers and in that world we shall all find a place regardless of color or religion."
