NO REASONS GIVEN FOR CANCELLATION

An agreement previously reached between the N.Y.A. and the WRA for the resident training program of Tule Lake Project youths has been cancelled, it was announced by Joseph Samler, N.Y.A. official, who recently visited the project.

Mr. Samler telegraphed from Denver in part as follows: "I am informed by Mr. Williams that N.Y.A. finds it unfeasible to continue the agreement previously reached with W.R.A. and asks that we immediately discontinue sending evacuees to N.Y.A. training centers. We have no alternative but to follow these instructions. It is not now possible to fully ascertain the reasons for cancellation of the agreement. Whatever its background, this is a great disappointment, particularly in view of the enthusiasm among youth at the projects for this opportunity. You may be assured

that we shall rescue everything possible from the agreement and shall inform you as quickly as possible of such alternative training plans as may be worked out."

Canada To Liquidate Property

While property rights of nisei are protected by law in the United States, across the northern border in Vancouver, the Japanese are threatened with liquidation of all their property which they left behind when they were forced to evacuate, the New Canadian, an independent weekly for Canadians of Japanese origin, disclosed.

Warning was given by Glenn MacPherson, representing the secretary of state, that advertisement would appear in the press informing the public that the Japanese properties were for sale, the New Canadian revealed.

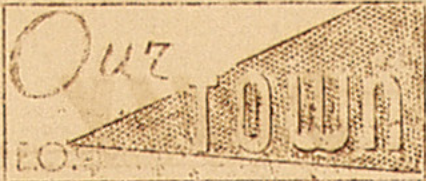
The possibility of any legal action to forestall such action seems remote although the Amalgamated Japanese Property Owners' Association are preparing to contest the legality of the liquidation procedure.

...free again. It certainly was swell to hear the hum of the wheels as the bus rolled on towards Reno, to see bill boards, to breathe scotless air, to see trees and vegetation, to roam around the city, to view neon lights, to eat anything, etc. Yep, it surely was grand.

First stop out is at an inspection station where one's lunch is inspected for bugs (in the fruits). Then after a brief rest in Alturas, we stop at Ravendale to eat our lunches with cokes or beer. With everyone taking so much lunch, the greater part of the food-stuffs find its resting place in Reno's S. P. Depot's trash can.

Boys going out are advised to take a sweater along to wear in the bus or train. It is very warm on the bus and train and very uncomfortable. Coaches of the train are very filthy. Girls are advised to take Pullman. Trains are full of servicemen. Chances of being molested on the train are very slim.

We ran across a man who just lost his beloved kid brother in the Pacific war front. He was drinking his sorrows away and when he saw us he almost started something. Thanks to Noboru Honda's cool-headed diplomacy we got away in one piece. Frankly we were so scared that we left the restaurant where the incident took place without our dessert which we were entitled to.

We must be doubly careful upon encountering such persons as they are emotionally upset.

Scenery just outside of Tule Lake is grand. But from Alturas on to Utah the view isn't much to speak of--just barren and desolated country side. But from the Great Salt Lake on, the sights are thrilling--fertile farm lands, snow-capped Rockies, etc.

"GOING TO MAKE GOOD," SAYS NISEI IN U.S. AIR CORPS.

Following are excerpts from a letter received by a Tule Lake resident from Sgt. James M. Ueno, who went to Camp Savage from here and who was recently transferred to the U.S. Army Air Forces in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania;

Dear Fred:

THIRD HIGHEST IN LEAVES GRANTED

A story in the Heart Mountain Sentinel reports that up until April 15, the Tule Lake Project ranked third among the ten relocation centers in indefinite and short term leaves issued with a total of 971.

Minidoka tops the list with 1167 leaves granted while Granada is a shade ahead of Tule Lake 998. Heart Mountain is fourth.

Salt Lake City is full of Japanese but they try not to walk around in big groups. We met Toko Fujii and Calhoun Hamai there and many other ex-Californians whom we knew. There are 125 nisei enrolled at the University of Utah which is referred to as the Waseda University. During lunch hours one runs across several Japanese faces out on the lawn. Many of these nisei are contemplating transfers because of the great number of Japanese enrolled. Faculty members are very understanding towards them.

Zoot suit boys are not unusual among Salt Lake nisei. They can be seen on the streets in quite some number.

We got our orders last Monday and two days before that we got our Sergeancy. It is a grand feeling to be called Sergeant...They treat us swell and I'm crazy about the Air Corps...We enjoy the most exclusive privilege allowed to any enlisted men.

...Our transfer to the Air Corps, especially to this school, is something no nisei has had the privilege of enjoying. We are going to make good for the nisei and at the same time erase the dirty splotches some of them have made for us. We are the only enlisted men to attend this school. The remainder are all officers. I see many Chinese officers and I don't say that it will apply to us but if we make good there will be many chances for those who follow us to become officers.

...We've been here only a few days but already a major has dropped in and complimented us on our conduct. We seem to have made favorable impressions upon the officers. I do not know when we will leave here but I hope they will let us remain here for sometime...
