## CO-OP MAIL ORDER DEPT. MOVES TO CANTEEN 4 NEW RULES ANNOUNCED

The Co-op Management announced that the entire Mail Order Service Department has been moved to Canteen #4, near the Administration Building. Because of this move, the following changes have taken place:

1. All mail order packages, both Montgomery Ward and Sears Roebuck & Company, are to be claimed at Canteen #4, instead of at Canteen #1.

2. All inquiries and requests are being accepted at Canteen #4 and no longer at Warehouse Office #5.

3. All orders are being accepted at the canteens as in the past.

## NEW PROCEDURE REVEALED IN UNEMPLOYMENT COMPENSATION PLAN.

Washington, D.C., June 8: Director Dillon Myer announced today that effective June 1, 1943, unemployment compensation will be paid only to those center residents actively as-

signed to project work who are unable to report because of illness.

This limitation is contained in a new Administrative Instruction which revises the entire unemployment com-

pensation policy.

Mr. Myer said that the change in compensation policy was decided upon at a recent meeting of WRA project directors in Washington. He explained, . . .

"With the increasing outside employment opportunities becoming available for evacuees and the mounting need for full labor utilization in our national war economy, it was felt that there is no longer any justification for paying unemployment benefits on any large scale. Any person who is unable to find work within the center is urged to discuss his sit-

Harry Mayeda spoke to the #67 Hi Liners and the Ward VII Clubs last week on the topic of "Resettlement", stressing its difficulties and advantages.

In summarizing, he quoted a section of Wm. Henry Chamberlin's "Why Civil Liberties Now?"

"The fight for civil liberties must be waged continuously, courageously and consistently or it will be lost. For the capacity to appreciate even to exercise these liberties might easily be atrophied in the event of a long suspension under the double pressure of bureaucratic encroachment and mass intolerance. What is even more appalling in the totalitarian society that the absence of liberty is the ever-growing lack of consciousness that there was such a thing as liberty to lose."

ulation with a member of the Employment Division Staff. In all likelihood, a suitable job can be found for him.

The new Instruction provides that hereafter there will be no waiting period between expiration of allowable sick leave and commencement of compensation. Upon certification by the Employment Division, unemployment compensation will be paid from the date the applicant became eligible.

There is no change in the rate of compensation. Persons certified as eligible will continue to be paid 60 percent of their wages; that is, \$7.20, \$9.60, or \$11.40 a month.

The maximum period for which compensation will be paid is 90 days. Eligibility must be reestablished every 30 days during this period through a physician's certificate.
