## Not All Eligible For Offices

Concerning those who may hold elective offices, an amendment to the Administrative Instruction reads as follows:

"...the voting age shall be 18 years, the person receiving the highest vote in each block shall be declared elected, and both citizens and aliens shall be eligible to hold elective office unless they fall within one of the following classifications: (1) persons who have requested repatriation or expatriation and who have not withdrawn their request at least three months (Cont. on page 3)

## Tenders Made On Property

VANCOUVER, B. C., June 18--L. G. Shears of the Custodian's office gave definite and final warning that advertisements calling for tenders for all Japanese real property would appear in Vancouver newspapers on June 19, according to the New Canadian.

The tenders will be left open for a period of one month.

Meanwhile the people of Japanese ancestry in Canada were attempting to raise enough funds so that they could fight the move with a test case.

## OBSERVE REGULATIONS IN

### Use Of Government Property

Employees of the War Relocation Authority and evacuees in relocation centers are reminded of the regulation that Government property may not be put to unofficial or personal use. In particular, official stationery and envelopes of the Government must never be used for personal correspondence.

On occasion, appointed personnel

and evacuees have used Government envelopes and stationery, using stamps to indicate its private use. However, this does not altogether destroy the impression that the correspondence is official or that it represents the view of the Authority. This may have embarrassing results for the relocation program.

Personal correspondence should be

written on stationery other than that provided by the Government. Franked mail, on Government stationery is to be used only for official business.

# COMMITTEE FOR DEMOCRACY SCORES DIES INVESTIGATION

(The following are excerpts from a news release by the Japanese American Committee for Democracy.)

Martin Dies and his "un-American Committee" recently made an attack on the War Relocation Authority and particularly upon its policy of resettling loyal Japanese Americans who were evacuated over a year ago from the West Coast military area. This is the climax of a series of false attacks, phony investigations, etc., directed against the Administration by the most vicious reactionary, anti-United Nations, anti-Roosevelt, anti-victory elements in this country. The Japanese American problem, exactly because the majority of the American people are still unfamiliar with its various aspects, is being used by these disruptive forces as another lever to create confusion and disaffection for the way our Government is handling the job of mobilizing our country and our people for winning the war.

...Secondly, Dies is trying to utilize the evacuee situation to instigate another wave of race antagonism and race hatred in order to bring

about demoralization and disunity and fear, in direct service to Hitler and Tojo's old intention to "divide and conquer" the people of the democracies...

...Because the War Relocation Authority, in spite of certain weaknesses, is carrying out an extremely difficult responsibility as part of the victory program of our democratic Government fighting a people's war, it is facing today the bitter opposition of Dies and the reactionaries in Congress and in certain State legislatures. The War Relocation Authority has consistently refused to allow the Japanese American evacuees to be considered as prisoners of war, nor to be handled as an un-assimilable racial minority. The present resettlement policy of the WRA is in direct answer to the country's need for all available manpower either in the armed forces or in production for victory. The evacuees, after investigation and clearance by the WRA and the FBI, are being released from WRA centers to take their places once more as a part of the whole American people. Their suc-

Successful integration into the war effort will not only strengthen the production program but will also be a tremendous blow against the false racism with which the Axis is trying to influence not only the American people but the millions of people in Asia as well...

However Mr. Dies tries to disguise his intentions by attacking the evacuees and the War Relocation Authority, the American people must become aware that the whole matter is an attack against the nation's war effort. Therefore all those who support the war effort and are working for victory must defeat this attack. The War Relocation Authority must be strengthened by the support of all Americans in its fight against Dies and his friends. The attempt to use the security and future of some 110,000 Japanese Americans as a pawn to split our national unity must be completely discredited and defeated. The best defense of the War Relocation Authority will be the successful resettlement of the evacuees, both citizen and foreign-born, into our Army, our industry and our trade unions, so that Japanese Americans can have an opportunity to work and fight side by side with all Americans to destroy the Axis. And the final answer to Dies and his "un-American Committee" is to remove them from positions of public power, so that in this most critical stage of the war, they will no longer be able to carry on flank attacks against the Administration and the American people.

# QUALIFICATION MUST BE MET BY THOSE HOLDING OFFICES

(Continued from page 1) before the date of the election; (2) persons who did not give an unqualified affirmative answer to Question No. 28 on Form WRA-126 Revised or Form DSS 304A and who have not subsequently been granted leave clearance; (3) persons who refused to register during the military registration conducted in February and March of 1943 and who have not subsequently been granted leave clearance; (4) persons who have been denied leave clearance."

The Administrative Instruction has been amended in the matter of those eligible to hold elective office and to serve on appointive committees, commissions, boards and other administrative positions in the community evacuee government so that all persons, whether citizen or alien who are 21 years of age or over are eligible, except (1) persons who have requested repatriation or expatriation and who have not withdrawn their request at least three months before the date of the election; (2) persons who did not give an unqualified affirmative answer to Question No. 28 on Form WRA-126 Revised or Form DSS 304A and who have not subsequently been granted leave clear-

ance; (3) persons who refused to register during the military registration conducted in February and March of 1943 and who have not subsequently been granted leave clearance; (4) persons who have been denied leave clearance."

At present, a petition to amend the Tule Lake City Charter to make issei representation on the City Council on an equal basis with nisei is being formulated. One-fourth of the qualified electors must sign the petition before it becomes effective.

When the next election is held to elect members to the Council, the above eligibility requirements must be met by those who are running, according to the supplement.
