CHURCH GROUP URGES EVACUEE RELOCATION

"Every effort to resettle the Japanese-Americans should be made now" and "further invasion of the right of citizens and unquestionally loyal resident Japanese jeopardizes the national unity and dangerously . raises the racial issue as barrier to a just and durable peace," ' is the opinion expressed by the Northern California Council of Churches in a letter to President Roosevelt on June 7.

The Council told the President that the recent state-ment attributed to Senator Buck of Delaware, "All the people with whom I talked in California vigorously opposed the return of Japanese" does not rep-

CONDITIONS IN KANSA'S

Mr. Wilson Graves, associate relocation officer of Kansas City, Missouri, stated that conditions were favorable for relocating in that area.

Upon being interviewed on the conditions prevailing in Kansas City he gave the following statement:

"A city with a population of 600, 000 affords many opportunities for ambitious workers in such fields as office work, jobs of technical nature, and also there is a promising future in the field of agriculture.

"Two hostels are now operating with a total capacity of twenty-four. We have a variety of industrial concerns who are willing to interview the people from the hostels.

"On the whole the sentiment toward the Japanese-Americans is very favorable and the newspaper too has aided by giving a grand support to the relocation program.

"As for the housing situation there is a committee composed of Council of Churches, Welfare Agencies, and the Y. M. and YWCA who are working together to help those relocating in that area."
