FIGHT FOR DEMOCRACY

The fight for freedom still rages in full fury as we solemnly observe the second war-time Independence Day. On all battle fronts the Allies go forth in grim determination to preserve the principles of that which we so deeply cherish, the Declaration of Independence.

"...THAT ALL MEN ARE CREATED EQUAL, THAT THEY ARE ENDOWED BY THEIR CREATOR WITH CERTAIN INALIENABLE RIGHTS; THAT AMONG THESE ARE LIFE, LIBERTY, AND THE PURSUIT OF HAPPINESS."

These are not mere words. It is the symbol of what we are fighting for, what we've fought for in the past and won--Democracy.

Today, on the home front, we find the essentials of the Declaration on a precarious footing. Misguided patriots are breaking down the very thing our boys and the Allied Nations are fighting for. Zoot suit fights, race riots, pressure against Japanese-Americans, etc., all are fascistic and un-American.


But we are confident of an Allied victory in the near future. Wild hysteria will subside and people will once again be able to think clearly and realize the evils of race hatred. Freedom shall reign throughout the world and Democracy shall reign supreme.

A new independence shall be won, an independence, not of one nation from another, but a more important independence from wanton hatred and strife.

TO GAIN THE VICTORY

"There are among us men who preach hatred of this or that minority, who would foment trouble between groups and classes.... The most elaborate and ingenious schemes of guaranteeing peace and spreading culture and prosperity are doomed to failure if the people who put the schemes in operation are brutalized, rotten with hates, and devoid of honor. The effort to end forever the periodic orgies of mass killing cannot be carried through to success by people who hold human life in contempt.... Victory will avail us nothing if, in the process of attaining it, we lose our perspective and permit the contagion of totalitarian amorality to affect our own hearts and minds." --Eric A. AFTER A YEAR'S SOJOURN

...in a make-believe world, nisei are being relocated to the freedom they knew prior to evacuation. It's been an incredible nightmare seeing Jap. faces everywhere day in and day out. They have gone back to America and the life reminiscent of Sacramento and Seattle.

Nisei are again congregating on sidewalks and other public places making themselves look conspicuous. "All-Nisei" dances, sports affairs and clubs are the very things we want to get away from. They breed prejudice. Prejudice breeds discrimination from employment and acceptance into American society.

We don't want to go back to that kind of life, an escapist's life of nisei ghettos and unattainable dreams. We don't want to see "No Japs allowed" and "Japs, Keep Moving" signs on restaurants, swimming pools and at city limits again.

We left that kind of life "back home" for good.
