Dillon S. Myer, director of the War Relocation Authority, charged that the Dies Committee's investigation of Japanese relocation centers has stirred up a public hatred which may lead to "further maltreatment" of American prisoners and internees in Japan, reported the Sacramento Bee.

the inquiry, Myer bluntly accused the committee and its investigations of "providing the enemy with material which can be used to convince the people of the Orient that the United States is undemocratic and is fighting a racial war.

"While Myer was testifying before the committee, the senate approved a resolution requesting President Roosevelt to direct the WRA to segregate disloyal from loyal Japanese in relocation centers.

"The resolution does not require house approval.

"Previous to Myer's testimony Mike M. Masacka stoutly championed the WRA's policies in handling interned Japanese and told the Dies Committee he believes restrictions on the release of Japanese from relocation centers should be loosened.
