ANNOUNCEMENT MADE BY DIRECTOR MYER; DETAILED INFORMATION STILL LACKING; PROJECT DIRECTORS TO MEET FOR DISCUSSION

The Tule Lake Project has been designated as the center to which evacuees considered disloyal to the United States will be assigned in the forthcoming segregation program. This announcement was made by Dillon S. Myer, director of the War Relocation Authority, in a long distance telephone call to Project Director Harvey M. Coverley.

The decision will mean that those persons now residing here who are found to be in sympathy with the United States will be transferred to other centers. Persons in other centers found to be disloyal to the United States will be transferred here. Those evacuees who are removed from this center will probably go to projects outside the restricted military area where they will have greater freedom of movement and better opportunities for relocation.

The exact status of persons assigned to the segregation center has not been established, but Mr. Myer has indicated that treatment will be quite like it is at present except that residents will not be eligible for leave privileges. The segregation center will not be considered as an internment camp and the persons residing there will not have the standing of prisoners or internees but will be considered as evacuees, although classified somewhat differently than other evacuees.

Detailed information regarding the segregation program and exactly what it means to the residents of the various relocation centers is still lacking. For that reason the Project Director and members of the appointed staff will be unable, for a few days, to answer many of the questions now arising in the minds of the evacuees. A conference of Project representatives is scheduled to be held in Denver July 26 and 27 at which the procedures for carrying out segregation will be discussed. Following this conference staff members will be in a much better position to furnish desired information. In the meantime the Project Director wishes to urge all evacuees to reserve any final conclusions until accurate data can be placed before them. "Please do not accept rumors as a substitute for facts," he requested. He pointed out that there will be ample time for discussions and meetings between the time the information is obtained and the time set for the beginning of segregation.

No definite reasons were given as to why the Tule Lake Project had been designated as the segregation center but since it has a very large number of persons who failed to register and who answered the loyalty question during the registration period in the negative, it is not surprising that the national director has reached this decision.

FRANK FAGEN SAYS...

Some Resettlers Creating Bad Effect for Relocation

Resettlers who take a definite job offer on the outside but who either do not report to the employer or only work for a few days on getting there are creating unfavorable attitudes to the relocation program and especially to evacuees from this center, discloses Frank D. Fagan, Placement officer.

Fagan said, "Letters are coming to the Placement office daily advising us of both young men and women who have left here on definite jobs but who have either failed to report to their employer or who have worked only a few days.

"These actions on the part of the evacuees from Tule Lake," he continued, "are having a very bad effect on the relocation program. We cannot emphasize too strongly the importance and necessity of evacuees, who intend to relocate and where re-

WORST DUST STORM YET

Last Sunday, Tule Lake residents witnessed one of the severest cases of a duststorm. Before this unexpected ordeal, the weather seemed to be ideal, almost perfect for baseball. No one ever dreamt that such a drastic occurrence could happen.

TULE LAKE ALL-STARS BLAST CAL-ORE SEMI-PROS, 16-8

The hard-hitting Tule Lake All-Stars plastered the semi-pro California-Oregon All-Stars, 16-8 last Sunday afternoon in a game which ended in the middle of the eighth inning because of the much discussed and unexpected dust storm.

It was hoped that the contest would be closer than the 16-0 drubbing that the locals handed the Pelicans on May 29, and it was for awhile, but in the closing stretch the Tuleans started building up a big margin.

The first inning gave a hint as to what a scoring spree the game was going to be.

Visitors were up first and with one down, a walk and a fielder's choice, followed by a double by Virgil Gross put the Cal-Oregon team in a 2-0 lead, momentarily.

When the locals took their turn at the plate in the opening frame, they banged pitcher Jim Snyder for three long hits and took the advantage back, 5-2. George Nakao, shortstop, led off with a triple, his first of four hits for the day, and came in on a squeeze play for the first run. Kimoto then singled, and Ishimoto and Ike walked to fill the bags. First baseman Morio Hada was the next sticker and he powdered a high fly which plunked down between the left and center fielders and by the time the ball was recovered, it was good for a homer and 4 runs.

In the next two cantos, Spike Muraoka, starting pitcher, held the border boys in check while the project team picked up a run in the second as Nakao doubled and came home on Matsumoto's single to right.

But in the same inning, the Tuleans had their best batting barrage. After Hayashida walked and Nakao singled, Bill Matsumoto brought in three scores with a four-bagger. At that point, Bart Goldbar replaced Snyder on the mound, and to keep the ball rolling, Johnny Kimoto greeted him with the second successive home run. Ishimoto kept it going with single, followed by another hit by Kawaye, and a big error and another squeeze play brought the two runners home before the rally ended. This made a total of six runs and put the locals ahead 12-7 and from that point on, they were never headed.

The California-Oregon All-Stars crossed the plate once in the sixth and that was all, while the Tule Lake squad added three runs in the seventh on no hits and 4 errors, plus one score in the eighth before the game was abruptly ended, with two outs, by the storm.

Batting stars of the day were Johnny Kimoto with a clean three hits, including a homer, for three trips; George Nakao, four hits for five times at the plate, including a triple, two doubles, and a single; and Abe Cox, also with a four for five, which in-
