MIDWEST FARMING WORK FOR FAMILIES PLANNED

Information has just been received from Mr. Elmer L. Shimell, relocation supervisor in Chicago, to the effect that he is endeavoring to relocate approximately six families on farms in the Middle West and three or four families on farms near Chicago, it was announced by the Placement office.

As soon as these job offers are definite, descriptions

and photographs of the communities will be sent to Tule Lake, or possibly a relocation officer will be sent with the information to interview those who may be interested in relocating on these particular farms.

It is planned to have the families who accept these offers to be related or who were former neighbors prior to evacuation so that they may work together as a unit.

Anyone interested in going out on such a plan should contact Mr. Frank Fagan, placement officer, personally as soon as possible.

"It is absolutely imperative that something be done on this program within the next thirty days if it is going to be put into effect this year," Mr. Fagan said.
