According to Mr. Tom Bodine of the American Friends Service committee, plans to enroll college students in the various Mid-Western universities are now under way. His story to this reporter is that the War Relocation Authority invited the American Friends Service committee to set up an organization to work out a program whereby students of college ages may leave the relocation and assembly centers to go to colloges in the East and the Mid-West. The War Department has inticated approval of this plan.

Monday-June 15,

1942

was held in Chicago on Friday, A mouting May 29th at which time representatives of Universities, Y. W. and Y. M., National Church groups, student organizations, W.R.A., and groups, U.S. Office of Education met and established the National Students' Relocation Council.

The Council is divided into two divisions, the Eastern and Western. The job of the Eastern division is to find universities and colleges which students may attend, to prepare the student body and the community for their infiltration, and to raise the necessary funds. These funds will be available to students in forms of transportation and scholarships, while additional tuition scholarships will be granted by the universities to those who are qualified. The Western division will send out questionnaires to all assembly and relocation centers and will send out interviewers to each camp. It is hoped that these questionnaires will be sent cut by the end of this month. Each student will be examined individually by the Fodoral government and given an individual certification.

The Western division is composed of Bob O'Brien, Scattle; Joo Conard, San Francisco; and Marion Reith, U.S.C.

The work opportunities for those who want to work their way through school will be provided. The National Students Relocation
Council estimates that this plan will cover
2500 students composing of high school graduates, college students, and graduates.
