COLONY NEAR FULL

With the arrival of 449 evacuees from the Pinedale Assembly Center today, the Tule Lake Relocation Center is almost filled to its capacity.

Today marks the end of evacuees arriving under army orders. A few hundred relatives of people here will arrive soon.

NO. 3 CANTEEN OPENS SATURDAY

The Community Store #3 will make a debut Saturday morning in Block 41 carrying most of merchandise sold in other two canteens except dry goods. The shoe repairing shop is now open for business.

DON'T WASTE WATER!

At present, three pumps are in operation to supply the need of 15,000 residents here. The present hot spell is taxing the hydrants to their maximum capacity.

Plans to install two more pumps in the near future are being made.

Until such time each member of the Tule Lake Colony is asked by Director Shirrell to be extremely careful with the use of water when he is washing taking showers, and doing laundry work.

Let no one suffer because of the lack of water in this Colony! Your cooperation is appreciated by the entire Community.

CIVIC IMPROVEMENT TO MAKE BETTER TOWN

Tentative plans, pending Army approval, include the construction of a senior high school, junior high school, three elementary schools, auditorium, library, dance studio, music studio, machine shops, bakery, theatre, and a community church.



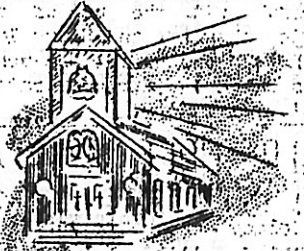
EDUCATION BUILDING WILL TAKE BIG SPACE

Howard Yamagata, Head Architect planning the schools, stated that, "All plans are subject to military rulings and should be interpreted accordingly." Architectural engineers working with him are: Don Toriumi, co-designer of the senior high school; George Yasui co-designer of the junior high school; Minoru Iwasaki, co-designer of the elementary schools; and Albert Koga, consulting engineer. Location of the junior and senior high schools will be in the firebreak between blocks 20-23. A library and an auditorium will be built between the junior and senior high schools. The elementary schools will be constructed in firebreaks between blocks 39-52, 34-35, 9-86; and nurseries will be established in conjunction with the elementary schools. A dance studio and a music studio with sound-proof walls, dressing rooms, workshops, offices, and practice rooms will be set up at #1908 and #2508 respectively. It was further added, that the schools will be one of the largest in the relocation centers.

NON-DENOMINATIONAL CHURCH PLANNED

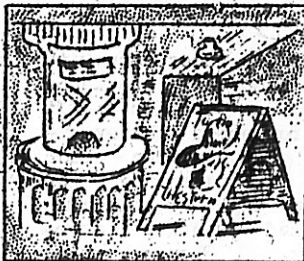
Extensive plans for a non-sectarian community church were disclosed by

Oliver Neji and Woody Ichihashi, co-designers. All religious denominations will hold equal rights in controlling the use of the church and office space, for every sect is included in the plans. The probable location of the church will be in the main firebreak between blocks 18-25. Chief Engineer, F. W. Slattery, submitted the plans to the regional office in San Francisco.



BAKERY TO MAKE BREAD, PASTRIES

The bakery's main enterprise will be in the production of bread and pastries but a school in baking will also be instituted in collaboration, stated Tomoo Nishisaki and Harry Nakahara, Architects for the bakery.

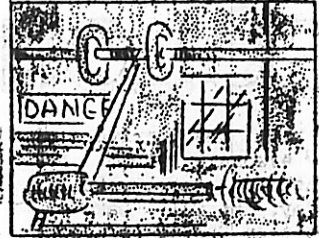


CENTER THEATER IN WARD ONE

WILL TEACH SOIL FERTILITY

Soil Fertility Course will be taught on Tuesdays and Thursdays for 6 weeks from 7 to 9 p.m. The course will include the general physical properties of soil, the effects of various nutrient elements, acidity and alkalinity. It is planned to include some demonstrations and the showing of movies.
