Citizens To Hold Rally

WILL BUILD JAIL HERE

A jail will be constructed on the Tule Lake Project immediately. This is in compliance with instructions received yesterday by Project Director, Elmer L. Shirrell.

F. W. Slattery, chief engineer, has been notified to begin work on the jail at once. It will be constructed directly behind Firehouse No. 1. Blueprints for the jail are already underway, and work will begin within the next few days, superseding any other construction on the Project, it was disclosed.

RAILROAD WORK ATTRACTS 20

With the arrival of permit for release from the regional office in San Francisco, 20 railroad workers joined the swelling list of people leaving for outside employment. Although scheduled to depart Thursday afternoon, failure of the release to arrive delayed their departure until 2 p.m. yesterday afternoon.

The men, majority of whom were former employees of the Great Northern Railways, left to work for the same outfit in Klamath and Des Chutes counties in Oregon.

Contract terms under which the men accepted the work were: 50 cents an hour for an eight hour day, time and a half for overtime and pay for their own room and board, the latter to be furnished by the company at \$8.75 per week.

Those people who worked 15 days in the month of August and those who were willing to work and their dependents are entitled to this allowance. This also applies to the family whose head was incapacitated due to illness.
