7 CHOSEN MEMBERS OF PLANNING BOARD

Permanent members of the City Planning Board were elected for the tenure of six months at the general meeting of block representatives held last weekend at Mess 15.

On last Monday, a meeting of these newly-elected members was held at #1307 at which Masahide Yamashita was elected chairman and Kihei Ikeda, vice-chairman, of the board.

The Planning board is composed of seven residents of this Project. It is designed to investigate various misunderstandings and disturbances before they come to affect the general welfare of the Colony, and also to "protect the interests of the colonists as a whole" in cooperation with the administration.

COMPENSATION REGULATIONS

That an evacuee who has been registered for work and has not been offered employment shall be eligible for unemployment compensation was revealed in a letter received from Washington D.C.

Unemployment compensation is intended to cover minimum essential for the individual and his dependents. It shall be at the rate of 60 percent of the primary classification for which the applicant (Cont. on pg. 3)

"B" LEAGUE QUINTETS MAKE DEBUT SUNDAY

Class B leagues, divided into the National and the American, will tee off Sunday afternoon with 15 teams entered.

Teams entered are Ten Belows, Wildcats, White River Cubs, Purple Waves, Penryn Pacers, Zephyrs, Timber Wolves, Crocker Tommies, Enumclaw, Marysville Jrs., Thunder bolts, Tacoma Bussei Jrs., Mik Jrs., Mess 41 Spartans, and Demodas.

The class of the league will be the Takala Zephyrs, who last week nosed out the powerful Question Marks of the Class A league. In doing so they remain undefeated since the start of last season in Sacramento Valley competition. Two teams that are expected to give the Zephyrs a hard run for their money will be the Miks Jrs. and the Crocker Tommies.

Mik Jrs., limited team of the famed Miks club, gave the Zephyrs some of their toughest games last year and may upset the dope cart on the slow, non-deceptive dirt court. Crockers will be led by coggy Babe Irokawa, first string pivot man of the undefeated Zephyrs of two years back, and boasts several members from last year's strong Zephyr Babes of the Wakaba cage organization.

Enumclaw, former entrant in the junior varsity division up north, may prove that pre-season favorites do not always come through. Penryn Pacers, from the mountain district of Northern California, will probably floor a strong outfit of former high school "C" players. If they follow the tradition of most foothill teams and use the long shots, they may prove to be more than a dark horse.

Although the calibre of the other entries are unknown, leaders are expecting to face a strong fight before their round robin games are played out.

The welfare section certifies the evacuee is qualified.

The original application for unemployment compensation shall serve as the basis for payment until the employment division directs the termination of payment because the applicant has been employed or has refused to accept employment offered.

Information regarding unemployment compensation as well as clothing allowance may be had at the block manager's office.
