AN EDITORIAL

A YEAR AGO TODAY

A year ago today Pearl Harbor was attacked. Since that time, this country has undergone a mental, moral, spiritual and physical transformation beyond anything the world has ever known.

Although America was not in the war, her sympathies were definitely committed to the Allied Nations. Billions of dollars have been spent in their behalf for those countries fighting aggression.

Since December 7th, this country has geared itself to total war—mentally, morally and physically. Five million men are now under arms, more than a million of whom are on foreign soil.

And how does this affect the nisei?

Nisei are affected just as much as any other American. Proof of this is in the number of young Japanese Americans who have enlisted in the Army

--some five thousand.

Only last week, 34 young colonists volunteered for the intelligence school at Camp Savage. Before that, and with only limited ways of showing their willingness to cooperate, they bought defense bonds, went to the beet fields. Young Japanese Americans are, and have been demanding a right to bear arms for their country.

If this is total war then it is total war for every American.

We are asking the same right as other Americans—total participation in total war. This should give us our rightful place when peace is won.

WHITE CHRISTMAS IN THE MAKING:

Santa Claus will see to it that none of the evacuated tots will be left out of his plans for a white Christmas, it was revealed in the Pacific Citizen.

More than 40,000 little Japanese Americans in the 10 relocation projects will be cared for by the various Christian denominations, service groups, JACL, and other organizations interested in the welfare of the Japanese evacuees.

The presents are being supplemented by a Community Christmas Party fund to insure complete coverage

age. Seventy-four Americans can soldiers, mostly nisei, but including six Caucasian and one Chinoese American, stationed at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas, have contributed a dollar apiece or \$74 in all to swell the Christmas fund. Japanese living in the free zone have not forgotten those in the projects either, for they too are making contributions to the fund.

Of the quota of an estimated 47,500 children, 46,075 have been accommodated. Projects whose quotas have not been met as yet are Colorado River

(Poston), Central Utah (Topaz), and Jerome.

Tule Lake's quota of 6,400 has been met by the following organizations; Disciples; Evangelical Reformed; Methodist; and Advisory Committee for Evacuees. Presbyterian, U.S.A., has agreed to be responsible for all of the Heart Mountain's quota of 4,000.

Joe Kanczawa, eastern JACL representative, at P.O. Box 1721, Washington, D.C., is assisting in correlating this Christmas program of sending gifts to children of the different projects.

A THOUGHT IN REVIEW

LITTLE THEATER GROUP

It amazed me pleasantly to discover the genuine histrionic talent inherent in some of our young colonists in Tule Lake.

Previewing the presentations of three one-act plays by the Little Theater Group Friday night in #408, it came to me that there is a great possibility of developing this sort of group here to entertain the mentally matured residents who are forever seeking escape from the grim reality of draft colony life.

Drama always acts as a cathartic of emotions. It makes people weep and laugh. If any play stirs a person's feeling, it has accomplished the first essence of its raison d'etre and fine art. The Little Theater players did this to the audience Friday night. And I believe they will continue to do so during the coming two-week performances with greater intensity.

Especially noteworthy was the performance of Grace Yamadera as Mrs. Anna Keeney in Eugene O'Neill's tragedy, "Ile." Miss Yamadera, we learned, has never been on the stage before. But her dramatic quality of self-expression portrayed the role she was assigned with understanding and appreciation. In a way she surpassed the fine acting of Perry Saito as Captain Dave Keeney.

George Kelly's comedy, "The Flattering Word," brought the house down with laughter. But the final five minutes were anti-climax. The curtain should have been drawn while the punch was still alive. Five Stars for Dickie Moriyasu for her smooth and professional acting. Four Stars for Hiroshi Kashiwagi. Mr. Kashiwagi, I believe, is destined to shine brilliantly later.

"Maker of Dreams," a fantasy by Oliphant Down, was in need of a larger stage and a better light-

ing system to inject color to the play that it deserves. But, then, we would be expecting too much from the present camp facilities. If we had one, we would have seen more brilliant dancing from Yukio Shimodri, the talented terpsichorean.

Congratulations to Mrs. Sada Murayama for her excellent job as director; and also to Garrett Starmer and Miss Jeanette Smoyer, high school faculty members, for their finishing touch.

The Little Theater Group deserves our whole-hearted support. H.M.L.
