

#### NO VIOLENCEIN TWO CHRISTMAS POSTON INCIDENT SCHEDULED FOR

Contrary to outside newspaper accounts the military police were never called inside the project and there was no violence at the time of "Poston incident," according to a government report received here today.

The start of the trouble, apparently, was the arrest of two evacuees at Poston Unit No. 1 Sunday, Nov. 15, who were charged with beating up another evacuee. FBI men came into the center to investigate the case and this created resentment on the part of a certain group of evacuees, said to be pro-Axis.

Taking advantage of the fact that the project director, the assistant project director and the chairman of the community council were absent from the project, this group brought pressure to bear resulting in the resignaof the Community tion Council of Unit l. A general strike was also called but the walk-out was also did not interrupt any of the essential services at the Unit. There was no barricade of the community jail.
