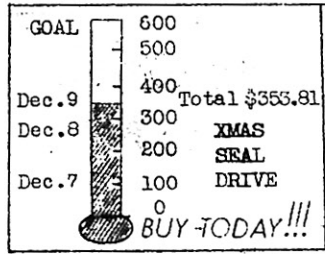

## COUNCIL PROPOSAL ON TENT FACTORY TO BE CONSIDERED

Discussing and studying the pros and cons of the tent factory proposal for three days, the City Council considered the plan in detail at a special meeting Wednesday evening.

Ward meetings are slated for Saturday evening, where the facts of the tent project will be presented to the respective block advisory committees.

## BENNETT TO SPEAK ON RECONSTRUCTION

LECTURING on "Post-War Reconstruction"; Professor John C. Bennett, internationally known writer and scholar, will speak before a public gathering Saturday evening from 7:30 o'clock at #2520.

Following the lecture, the audience will be given an opportunity to ask questions.

On Sunday, he will speak at the worship service at #2508 from 10 a.m.

Bennett is the author of "Social Salvation", "Christianity and Our World", and "Christian Realism". He also wrote the pamphlet, "The Touchstone of Democracy", on the evacuation from the coast.

## BOY SCOUTS GUARD FLAG IN MANZANAR RIOTING

How 14 heroic young Japanese-American Boy Scouts armed only with stones protected the American flag during the rioting which occurred in Manzanar on Dec. 6 was told in a story to the San Francisco Chronicle on Dec. 10 by Ralph P. Merritt, Manzanar project director.

"One of the Pro-Axis sympathizers," Merritt said, "started for the flagpole to haul down the flag. The Boy Scouts, who quickly surrounded the base of the flagpole, defied the agitators or the whole mob to touch the flag. And the flag was not hauled down."

Merritt said the administration building flagpole was near the arena where the mob formed with the Stars and Stripes waving in the fresh breeze.

One man was killed and eight injured when soldiers fired into the riot-

ers after repeated warnings to stop advancing were ignored.

Conditions at Manzanar were reported quiet today. W.R.A. officials from Washington, meanwhile, are flying West to join in investigation of the incident.

### 'IT'S A DATE' WITH A MOVING PICTURE

**DEFINITE CHANGE IN TOKYO RADIO PROPAGANDA NOTED**

WASHINGTON (Office of War Information Service)—Tokyo says, in a Japanese-language broadcast to Japan and the Empire (November 11): "Stimson recently announced that America had completed the Alaskan Highway but much propaganda was put into these words. However, it is definitely established that America is working for the protection of Alaska and to be able to carry out attacks on Japan. Senator Burton stated that Tokyo must be bombed and that Alaska is the best suited base. By the above facts it is known that the Aleutians are very important, and America is hastening to complete the Alaskan highway.

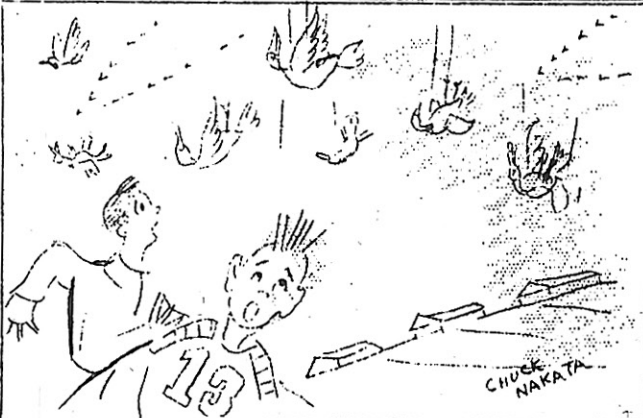
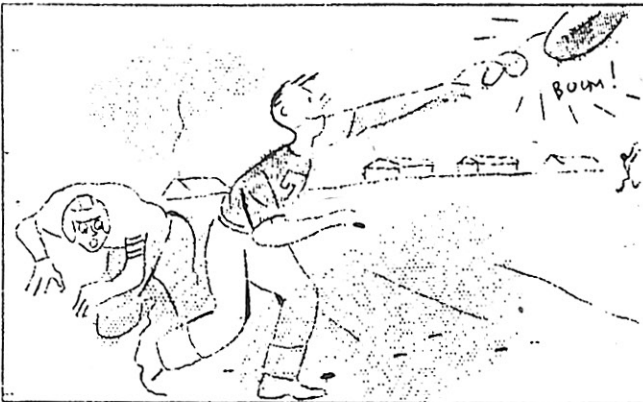
"We must specially note the fact that now bombers made in America are capable of traveling from Fairbanks to Tokyo in only 15 hours.

The fact that our forces have occupied various important locations in the Western Aleutians means that the fighting

has turned from the eastern hemisphere to the western, thus breaking through its front line and pushing toward the eastern Pacific"—Capt. Hideo Hiraide, official naval spokesman, June 10, 1942.

"Imperial Army and Naval forces holding strategic points in the Aleutians are completely fulfilling their duty of protecting Japan against possible American attacks from the North. The Japanese capture of Kiska and Attu was a defensive move aimed at frustrating American designs to attack Japan from the north, and success of the Japanese action was proved by the fact that Japan's northern territory has not yet been attacked by even a single enemy plane." —Kenichi Nakaya, Nov. 11.

These two statements, broadcast five months apart, dramatically indicate the shift in Japanese radio propaganda from a positive aggressive spirit to an almost negative defensive spirit.

# NO VIOLENCE IN POSTON INCIDENT TWO CHRISTMAS CHOIR CONCERTS SCHEDULED FOR HOLIDAY SEASON

Contrary to outside newspaper accounts the military police were never called inside the project and there was no violence at the time of the "Poston incident," according to a government report received here today.

The start of the trouble, apparently, was the arrest of two evacuees at Poston Unit No. 1 Sunday, Nov. 15, who were charged with beating up another evacuee. FBI men came into the center to investigate the case and this created resentment on the part of a certain group of evacuees, said to be pro-Axis.

Taking advantage of the fact that the project director, the assistant project director and the chairman of the community council were absent from the project, this group brought pressure to bear resulting in the resignation of the Community Council of Unit 1. A general strike was also called but the walk-out did not interrupt any of the essential services at the Unit. There was no barricade of the community jail.
