## OUTLOOK PROMISING FOR CIVIL SERVICE POSITION

An answer to the many letters which have been sent to the regional office in San Francisco, regarding the eligibility of evacuated American citizens of Japanese descent for Federal civil service positions was given recently by E.M. Rowalt, regional director. His statement follows:

"Realistically and practically no final or definitive answer can be given to this question at the present time. There is no formal or legal prohibition against the employment of citizens of Japanese descent in the Federal Civil Service. Many departments and agencies of the Federal Government, however, appear to be reluctant to appoint such persons."

"The War Relocation Authority has discussed this matter with the Civil Service Commission and has found the Commission favorably disposed toward the employment of qualified evacuees in the Federal service. It will be necessary, however, to carry on similar discussions with the numerous Federal departments and agencies which do the actual hiring.

"At the present time, therefore, it can be reported that the outlook has some promise, but that it will probably be several months before any considerable volume of Federal employment may develop for evacuees. Meanwhile, evacuees who have held civil service positions or who are on civil service registers should file their civil service ratings noted in their applications or on Forms WRA-26 which accompany them.

"For the present, evacuees who are interested in possible Federal employment but do not have civil service status or standing on a civil service register as a result of passing an examination,

## DR. ICHIHASHI

**P**URSUIT OF KNOWLEDGE keeps a person young. And in a world torn with human conflicts, the act of "pursuit of knowledge" makes a man forget the grim reality of life. It sears his spirit high toward heaven.

Dr. Yamato Ichihashi, the Stanford professor now residing in this Colony, gave a lecture Wednesday night in Ward 4 on a phase of Japanese civilization. Of all the topics he has the authority to speak on, the professor chose "The Temple of Koryuji" to give an hour and half of untimely classroom talk.

To the journalist in me, whose prime interest in human activities is timeliness, the lecture was dry as Tule Lake dust. But to the human side of me, who is thirsty for knowledge for the sake of knowledge, it poured into my brain like pearls.

In time of war when people are clamoring for bread and water and people's hearts are filled with hatred and misery, who cares when Koryuji Temple was rebuilt—whether in 629 or 649? Who cares how it now stands in Nara despite its wooden structure? Who cares what Fenerosa, the Italian art critic, said about the beauty of its architecture and wall paintings?

But, sometimes, it is good to drown one's news consciousness and dronch his heart and soul with knowledge that comes from being away from the maddening crowd. Dr. Ichihashi's lecture sent me back to the days when I, too, was a student whose only interest in life was delving into the writings of men dead centuries ago. Then, the problems of obtaining bread and milk were never existent; what other people thought about you or me didn't even bother. The days were always warm and sunny.

While listening to the professor propound the scholastic theory of the

We realize the only opportunity for the nisei to join the armed services for the present time is in this Military Intelligence School at Camp Savage. The barrier there for this enlistment is the command of the Ja-

panese language. Mr. Hashida thinks that such a school here would benefit those youths who have already learned the fundamentals to refresh their memory.

He does not offer any suggestions however, for those nisei, who are more than willing to enlist but never had the opportunity to attend a Japanese language school. If preference were given here at Tule Lake to those who have already mastered the language, this still leaves a barrier for numerous able boys.

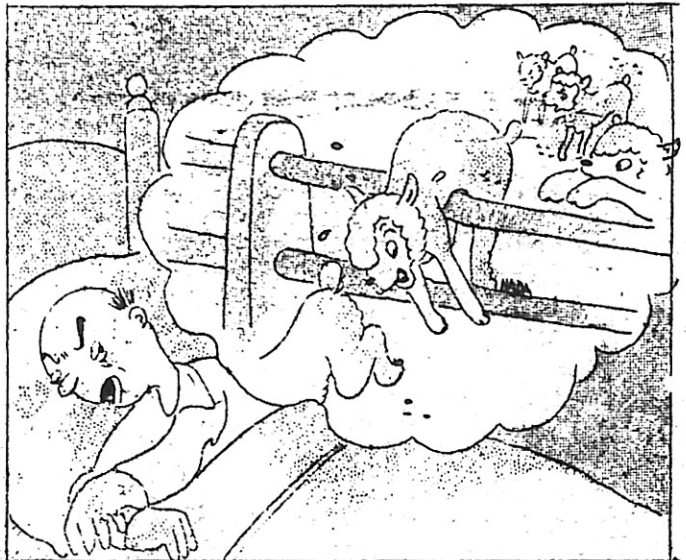
We have nearly five months to make preparations for the next recruitment. A few hours of learning every day would enable many beginners sufficient command of the language to qualify for the enlistment.

When the classes have progressed to the point where the fundamentals have been mastered, those students who wish to refresh their memory of the fundamentals also could do so with ample time of preparation before the recruiting officials arrive. In this way, all the eager nisei would have an equal opportunity and they can never say they never had the chance.

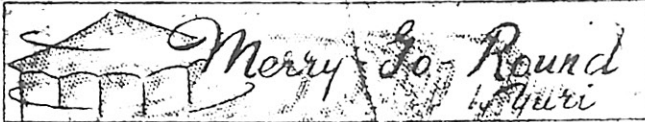

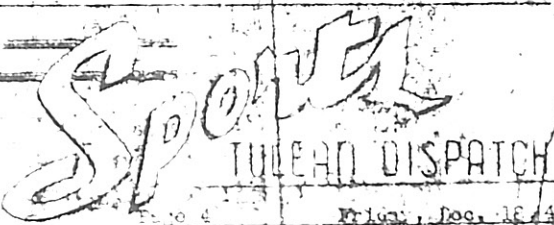
