RITTERS TO GUIDE HOSTEL PROJECT 10 TULEANS EXPECTED TO BE CHOSEN MONTHLY

To facilitate those persons in the Project who would be interested in being relocated through the Hostel House in Chicago, sponsored by the Church of Prethren, applications are to be accepted by Mr. Edgar Ritter of this Project.

At the present time, the Ritters may be interviewed at their home at 211-2 in the teachers quarters located in the warehouse area. Offices are

expected to be set-up soon in the Project to accommodate applicants.

Before leaving the Project, Ralph Smeltzer, head of the Hostel House in Chicago and former Manzanar school teacher, stated that 10 persons are expected to be taken from Tule Lake each month in this new experimental method of relocation. If this method proves successful, the program will be accelerated.

MINISTER LAUDS OREGONIAN HOSTEL ESTABLISHED TO AID EVACUEES

Commenting on the article dealing with Japanese evacuees which appeared recently in the Oregonian, the Baker Ministerial Association through its president, Reverend S. A. Walker, sent a letter of commendation to the editor.

Letter appearing in the Mar. 9 issue said, "The Baker Ministerial association directed its president and secretary to act as a committee of two to send you a letter of commendation for the courageous and unbiased attitude of the articles entitled 'The Wrong Ancestors'."

There is so much unworthy, un-Christian, un-American and undemocratic sentiment being stirred up in relation to these unfortunate people, the nisei, that any unbiased statement concerning them and their circumstances should receive the commendation of all who love justice and democracy.

We are not advocating the cause of the Japanese government nor are we disciples of silly sentimentalism. We are advocates of the golden rule. If any Japanese proves a traitor of this country, let that one be dealt with as should any traitor, but let us not crucify a whole group of people with the sins of those over whom they have no control.

To find jobs for evacuees and to provide them with a temporary, inexpensive place to stay, until the job is found, the hostel idea was born. Ralph Smaltzer revealed at a meeting of the C.A. group. The hostel now established at Chicago is the first of many now being planned.

A pioneer experimental group that were sent to the hostel from Manzanar were all successfully placed within three days. It is fairly assured that one may be placed within two weeks.

Jobs available in Chicago include domestic, secretarial and stenographic, mechanical, civil, service, store room clerks, sale clerks, and various professional positions. The field of engineering is very limited. Depending on the individual industry, jobs may or may not be had in do-

defense plants. The hostel has at its service four employment agencies. They are the WRA field office, placement agency under Mr. Temple, American Friends Service Committee, and the U.S. Employment Service.

Application is open to all persons whether he be nisei, kibe, or issei provided he has answered yes to question #28 and has applied for leave clearance. Loans are made available to evacuees through means of a revolving fund. Trains are met and evacuee is taken on a sight seeing tour upon his arrival.

Rate at the hostel is a dollar a day for board and room. If the job is found the rate is \$12 a week until the evacuee finds a place for himself. Rooms can be found ranging from \$10-\$25 a month. It was revealed that Chicago can take 2000 Japanese before their presence can be noticed.
