CIVIL LIBERTIES UNION READY TO HELP REMOVED EVACUEES

The American Civil Liberties Union is ready to help or assist with legal advice to all evacuees including those arrested or removed from the Project, according to information received by Project Director, Harvey M. Coverley.

The American Civil Liberties Union's headquarters is in New York City, but there is a branch office at 216 Pine Street, San Francisco, California.

REGISTRATION Deadline Set For Mar. 24

Registration of female citizens and male and female aliens 17 years of age and older will close on Mar. 24.

Those unregistered are urged to sign-up at their earliest convenience.

The female citizen registration is conducted in the personnel recreation hall in the administration area.

Alien registration is being held at 6678 and the visitors building.

2571 INDEFINITE LEAVES ARE GRANTED; 88 FROM COLONY

Up to Mar. 6, 2,571 persons had been granted indefinite leave and had left the relocation centers, according to word received by The Tulean Dispatch. 88 persons from Tule Lake are out on indefinite leave and 70 have left the Project to enroll in various schools and colleges.

Another 2,542 persons have been granted advance clearance and these people are ready to leave the centers as soon as satisfactory employment arrangements have been completed.

While the majority of Tule Lake residents were unaware of his presence, Senator Wallgren, (Demo.) Washington, author of the bill to transfer control of WRA

back to the Army because of reported coddling of evacuees, visited the Project Tuesday.

Presumably to obtain the real facts about relocation life, he toured the Project and dropped in unexpectedly at many of the places and talked with some of the workers.

Whether he was here on official business in connection with the congressional committee, which is investigating reported coddling of evacuees, was not intimated.

He left Tuesday night for an unknown destination.
