

W.R.A. Director Myer To Visit

National Director April 14.
Dillon Myer and Chief Attorney Philip M. Glick of the War Relocation Authority are to arrive on the Project Wednesday, disclosed.

ELIGIBLE PERSONS FOR RELOCATION GRANTS

APPLICATIONS ARE TAKEN AT SOCIAL WELFARE DEPT.

According to the latest administrative instructions, provisions for monetary aid will be made to evacuees, who have been granted indefinite leave subsequent to March 3, 1943, if they meet certain eligible standard. Paul Fleming, chief of Community Services, announced today.

Before his departure, individuals should apply for the rest of his family needing financial aid at the Social Welfare Department, #1808.

The total cash resources of the family should be sufficient to cover each

member of the family, \$3.00 per person per day of travel for meals en route, and cash to meet initial subsistence expenses at the place of employment calculated as follows:

\$50.00 for the wage earner plus \$25.00 for one dependent or plus a total of \$50 for two or more dependents that will accompany or follow him on indefinite leave. If the family's cash resources do not equal this amount, assistance will be given to the extent needed to raise their cash resources to this total.

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27 RELEASED FROM CCC CAMP

Hearings were held Thursday morning at the personnel hall for the 27 men who had been confined at the CCC camp for refusal to register during the registration period.

Of the 27, there were 24 who were released; the remaining three were sent to the isolation camp in Utah to serve out the balance of their original 60 day sentence.

Harvey Coverley, project director, and Paul Fleming, chief of Community Service were the examiners.

WRA Will Aid In Finding Housing For Evacuees

In cities where the housing situation has been most acute, the National Housing Agency has established War Housing Centers, where new arrivals are given information on living quarters available. This applies to family apartments and to rooms.

Relocation officers of the WRA are also in a position to direct persons

relocating to church groups and other local agencies who are willing to lend assistance in finding housing accommodations.

The government leases large homes and other buildings and converts them into multi-family units and dormitories.

Some of the cities in the Middle West where War Housing Centers are located are: Michigan; Battle Creek, Detroit, Flint, Muskegon, Pontiac, Saginaw, Kentucky; Louisville; Ohio; Akron, Canton, (Cont. on Page 3)

"When we went to register at the hotel," Mrs. Murayama related "all the hotels refused to accept us as group. There were five Japanese and one colored woman in the group. The delegates then decided to boycott all the hotels and were housed in private homes."
