## COAL CRISIS PASSES WHEN VOLUNTEERS GO TO WORK

The coal crisis, precipitated by the accumulation of loaded cars of coal on the track, was satisfactorily passed Thursday through the whole-hearted co-operation of the colonists, Dan Sakahara, supervisor of Civic Organization, revealed. Forty-two car-

loads, about seven a day, were unloaded since last Friday by volunteers recruited by block managers. "The Civic Organization really admires the cooperative spirit of the colonists, and appreciates their unselfish support," Sakurada commented.

## CONDITIONS ARE GOOD FOR RESETTLEMENT...HOLLAND.

WASH. D.C., May 3--"How can we get more people in the relocation centers to resettle?" was the burning question in the mind of Thomas W. Holland, head of the WRA Employment Division. At his desk in the Barr Bldg., Holland expressed deep concern at the apathy of the evacuees towards resettlement.

"The WRA was handicapped in the earlier stages of this program and consequently it moved slowly and clumsily but now that it has been speeded up and good and varied job offers are now coming in, the evacuees are now holding up the show," Holland declared.

### NO PIANOS NOW

Since both pianos are unusable, they will not be let out until they are repaired, Recreation Dept. reported today.

Date will be announced when the pianos are available to the public again. The outside were extremely favorable for nisei resettlers.

Holland revealed a deep understanding of some of the deterrents towards relocation but was emphatic in his belief that resettlement was the only practical solution of integrating the nisei and many of the issei into the normal pattern of American life.

"I'd love to see," concluded Holland, "more of the evacuees take advantage of our resettlement plan, that is come out on indefinite leaves, get public assistance grants if they lack the

## ATTACK ON NISEI CONTINUES

The news of the execution of U.S. airmen, in violation of all international law of decency, by the Tokyo militarist has increased the indiscriminate attack on the nisei in this country. Attack on nisei have, continually, been carried on by various organizations, especially those on the Pacific coast.

It is deplorable that only the adverse opinions about nisei always get prominent notice in the press while the true facts receive little publicity.

### REACTIONS OF DISCRIMINATION

"Deport them." "Take away their citizenship." "Keep them in the centers." These are the cries now being fanned through many of the presses and radios.

Nisei in relocation centers have reacted in various manners to these vituperations. Some have just shrugged their shoulders with, "What's the use attitude." A great many have become more embittered and consequently see only futility beyond the barbed wire fence. A few refuse to see just the dark side of the picture and look optimistically into the future.

### NEED STABLE MENTAL OUTLOOK

As we read day by day the denunciation upon our loyalty, it will become increasingly difficult to maintain a mental equilibrium.

But the need for stable mental outlook to our whole problem rise in direct proportion to the increase of these inflammatory invectives.

### LOOK BEYOND OUR BITTERNESS

Our bitterness looms so large in our minds that we fail or refuse to see anything beyond it. We forget that there are organizations and individuals who are working just as tirelessly as the opposition to bring about just treatment of the nisei.

We forget too that the utterances of the Native Sons and Daughters of California, Hearst newspapers, General DeWitt, Senator Ranklin, and many other individuals as well as organizations do not represent the consensus of the general public.

### REMEMBER THOSE WHO HELP

We should remember that the WRA, the Federation of Churches, Committee for Fair Play, Civil Liberty Unions, Committee for the Protection of the Minority Group and several others are on the other side of the balance sheet.

The discrimination and agitation against the nisei which we often see in the newspapers so obsess our minds that we look forward to them as if to justify our obsessions.

### FUTURE WILL BE HARD

This is a dangerous state of mind to acquire, for it borders close to fanaticism. The adversity which faces us now is not the last. During the course of the war, and even after, there will be many more coming up. The nisei as a group have not faced adversity before because the issei always cleared the way for them.

### NISEI MUST TAKE THE LEAD NOW

Since the outbreak of the war this role has been reversed. If we are to wallow about in self-pity and bitterness over our fate without any mental buoyancy whatever, our restoration into normal community life will be a long and hard process.

## MANAGERS CLARIFY PITCHING, FOUL RULES

With 23 representatives at the softball meeting, the following rules were adopted:

5. Ball hitting home plate is a foul ball and counts as a strike.

## OPA SETS CEILING PRICE ON ALL USED TRUCKS

Effective April 26, the CPA fixed a ceiling price on all used trucks, ambulances, busses and other used commercial vehicles.

The new regulation set the top legal price of any of these vehicles at the percentage of its original delivered price.

Depending on age and partly on whether the vehicle has been reconditioned, the percentages range from 26 to 97 per cent of new cost.

The ceilings, which are percentages of the delivered new price (plus extra equipment) follow:

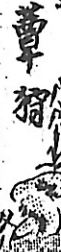
