Shoe Certificates To Be Distributed On Arrival

DELAY NO FAULT OF MGRS.

Rather than to delay distribution until the arrival of shoe certificates for all the blocks, the certificates will be distributed as they come so that some persons will be able to buy shoes, according to Dan Sakahara, supervisor of Civic Organization.

"We realize," said Sakahara, "that it is not quite fair

for the persons who wait longer, however, I assure you that this delay and irregular arrival of certificates is not the fault of your Block Manager.

"These certificates are being issued to individual applicants by the Tule Lake Board after thorough examination of the applications by them," he added.

A DEED FOR THE COMMUNITY

Volunteer workers unloading coal are again doing a fine deed for the welfare of the community. Without their cooperation much of the valuable coal needed by the colonists would have been lost. With transportation taxed by war-time necessity, every car must be unloaded as quickly as possible and put back on the road again so that it can serve the war needs of the country. The railroad companies cannot keep the cars standing idle on the sidings longer than necessary. Therefore, the need for unloading coal as quickly as possible is urgent if we are to avoid the consequence of forfeiting the coal which is shipped here.

Sometimes the regular crew is unable to handle the amount of coal which comes in at one time. Then, in order to keep the car moving on schedule, volunteer workers are needed.

The response from the colonists, whenever such emergencies have risen, has been highly satisfactory. Office workers, firemen, wardens, mess workers, and all others, whether young or old are enthusiastically helping. The spirit of unselvish cooperation is commendable.

ABOUT SHOE CERTIFICATES

The Klamath Falls and Tule Lake Town C.P.A. board has returned thousands of applications for shoe rationing to the Project on the ground that "they do not represent sufficient degree of need."

This seems to us an unusual reason for not issuing many residents here a shoe certificate. It was our understanding that a person was entitled to so many pairs of shoes a year under the ration ruling and did not have to show his "degree of need."

Of course, to buy things which are unnecessary is unpatriotic. But as far as clothing is concerned at the present time, a person is trusted to his own judgment. It is our understanding that a person on the outside could go to a store selling footwear and buy a pair if he has a Ration Book 1 with the stamp No. 17 intact.

With no mode of travel here except by walking and with the sand making shoes wear twice as fast as usual, most of us, and especially the children, will need all the shoes that we can get.

Under these conditions, why do we in this center have to show our "degree of need" before we may be issued a certificate to buy a shoe. Isn't our word good enough?
