Artificial flower exhibit will be held on Monday, May 24 to Saturday, May 29 at #4408 by the Floral Arts department, according to Togo Yasuda, business manager.

Mrs. Sue Oda, who is in charge, announces that the exhibit will follow the garden scheme.

Miss Natalie Perry, special students advisor from East Orange, New Jersey, arrived here on May 17, to organize a education program for handicapped children under the Dept. for Special Students. The classifications include the hard of hearing

the deaf, visually handicapped, those with physical handicaps and other children who, because of illness and other reasons, need special and individual help with their work which they are unable to get in ordinary large classrooms.

She also added that she hopes to assist children especially advanced in school work that they do not fit in classes of children their own age.

Miss Ruth Takagi, former graduate of Berkeley School of the Deaf, was specially transferred

on May 12 from Manzanar, Calif., to assist Miss Perry in organizing such a program. This department will work in cooperation with the schools, social welfare and the medical social welfare departments.

It will take some time for plans to get underway for they are expecting to have a separate building and conduct a school carrying a full program.

Miss Perry states that, "We are studying the children individually in order to plan the best program for each of them."
