## OPENING FOR 38 WORKERS

Thirty-eight workers are needed in a defense factory in Cincinnati, Ohio making hospital beds for the U.S. Army, the Placement Office revealed yesterday.

The positions include welders, press operators, common laborers, apprentices, and others. Wages range from 45¢ to 95¢ an hour, depending on the type of work and experience. The work week is 49 hours with time and a half for time over 40 hours. Details can be secured at Placement.

## Procedure For Transfer Of Residence In Project

Housing Department requests the cooperation of all colonists in regard to transfer of residence.

All transfers within the Project must first be cleared through the Housing Department, and must have the consent of the present block manager and the manager of the block where he intends to live.

These instructions must be followed

carefully because: (1) It is necessary for the Housing Department to keep an accurate record of every individual. (2) In case of emergencies names are referred to the Housing Division and addresses checked. (3) The Housing Department notifies all change of address to the Post Office, Mess Management, Hospital, Clothing Unit, Internal Security, etc.

# URGE FULL USE OF LOYAL ALIENS IN DEFENSE WORK

Urging full use of all loyal aliens, the War, Navy and Justice Departments, and the Maritime Commission today jointly announced shortening and simplification of the procedure whereby holders of government airplane and "classified" contracts may obtain permission for hiring aliens within two weeks or less, according to the Office of War Information.

A statement signed by Secretary of War Stimson, Attorney General Biddle, Secretary of Navy Knox, and Maritime Commission Chairman Land also emphasized that government contractors may employ aliens as freely as citizens on all other types of work; and in fact, such contractors are forbidden by Executive Order 8802 from discriminating in hiring because of a worker's race or national origin.

Major points of the alien employment policy stressed in the statement follow:

1. Full use should be made of all loyal and qualified workers irrespective of national origin or citizenship.
2. Contractors may employ aliens as freely as American citizens except on aeronautical or classified contracts.

3. Contractors may employ aliens on aeronautical and classified contracts if they obtain the written consent of the head of the government department concerned.

4. The anti-discrimination clause applies equally to citizens and non-citizens.

5. The anti-discrimination clause applies to work under aeronautical and classified contracts.

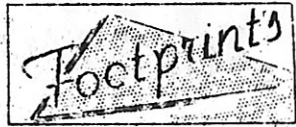
6. The procedure for securing permission to employ an alien on aeronautical or classified contracts has been shortened so that the employer should now receive a decision on his request within less than two weeks.

7. An employer is not subject to any penalty, if, in good faith, he obtains the written consent of the head of the Government department concerned before an alien is permitted to have access to the work under aeronautical or classified contracts.

8. The contractor's responsibility for plant security applies to all persons regardless of their citizenship.

Mayor Bowen of Los Angeles was thus scored upon in a column, El Rodeo, of The Tidings, official organ of the Archdiocese of Los Angeles, for his undemocratic accusations upon the nisei.

"The state of war existing between our country and Japan gives no one the right to invite a

pervasion of our Constitution...

"At present it is popular to speak of all the Japanese as degenerate, rotten little devils! The gates are opened wide and anything goes..."

"The Catholic priests who have attended them at Santa Anita and Manzanar speak nothing but the highest words of praise in their behalf."

"Let the Mayor of Los Angeles remember his responsibility before the people of this community, and let him weigh well his words lest he prove false to the American ideal of democracy."

# CITY PLAY-OFF GAMES TONIGHT
