Gila loses Co-op License

Arizona Corporation Commission recently rejected the application of the Gila River Cooperative Enterprises to do business in Arizona on the grounds that the cooperative, which filed as a non-profit corporation, does not comply with Arizona's laws governing non-profit corporations in that its 7,879 members would benefit through savings in the services it was organized to render, reports the Gila News-Courier.

At a hearing, the case of the government and the Gila River Cooperative Enterprises was presented before the Arizona Commission in the hope that the order cancelling the license would be revoked.

day sit-down strike in the plant, according to a United Press report in the Pacific Citizen.


Work resumed when he agreed to stay away from the packing company.

CONSTRUCTION OF PROJECT SCHOOLS NOW 70% COMPLETE

With all Tule Lake school students anxiously watching, the new Junior and Senior High Schools moved one step closer toward reality this month. The entire construction on the school is 70% complete, according to Tosh Asai, assistant engineer.

Completion of this structure will be speeded up considerably with the arrival of the iron for the truss. Harry Katsuyama, the building engineer, stated.

LAYOUT OF NEW HIGH SCHOOL



SKETCH A--The 44' x 22' wood-work shops are 90% done. It will be finished as soon as the windows are installed. The shop will also be used as storage space for material to be used on the balance of the buildings.

SKETCH B--Under the supervision of senior foreman, I. I. Yoshizumi, the 50' x 217' classroom building is 80% complete.

SKETCH C--Only 50% of the 12-room classroom building, which includes two rest-rooms for the instructors, is complete. This building is under the supervision of senior foreman, "Sport" Wadamura.

SKETCH D--The combined gym-auditorium building, under the direction of Richard Kondi, is approx-

imately 60% finished. "Completion of this structure will be speeded up considerably with the arrival of the iron for the truss." Harry Katsuyama, the building engineer, stated.

SKETCH E--The 50' x 263' home economics, science, commercial, and art and craft building is under the supervision of senior foreman, R. Tanabe. This building is 70% completed.

SKETCH F--40% completed is the 12-room classroom and biology room building, which is under senior foreman, S. Yamato.

SKETCH G--The 10-room classroom building is about 50% complete.

SKETCH H--Awaiting installation of windows, the administration building is 90% complete.

The bottleneck in constructing buildings has been the slow arrival of materials. The buildings are now expected to be finished in about two months.



GILA

Passes to Phoenix were reduced to an absolute minimum because of resentful feeling in Phoenix toward Japanese fascists. Rumor to the effect that eight persons of Japanese ancestry had been killed in Salt Lake City was curbed.

Nominations for the July 4 queen contest is now in full swing. Water shortage hits Gila.

MENIDOKA--Ratification or rejection of the Charter for Community Advisory Council will have been voted upon July 15. By an unanimous approval, a printed Japanese section of the Irrigator was voted upon.

POSTON--Twenty issei and 12 nisei were elected into the Community Council of Unit I. 1384 evacuees left the project during the last four months, it was revealed by the Employment Division.

Many types of fish are being sent into Poston, English sole, barracuda, corbina, and red snapper. Plenty fishy, huh? A new record was established by the Agricultural Department of Unit 3. Approximately 600 field crates of nappa were harvested from one and one-fourth acres.
