## Petition To Amend City Charter Approved; One-fourth Must Sign

The Committee for Amendment of the City Charter gave their approval of the petition on June 21 requesting that a special election be held for the purpose of amending the charter of Tule Lake Project.

The seven committee members chosen to draft this petition are as follows: A. Kawasaki, 1501-D; K. Ikeda, 3013-B; M.

Omachi, 2205-A; Ajima, 2017-D; Takesuyé, 4705-E; Matsumoto, 5616-A; Dr. Kuki, 6713-E.

One-fourth of the qualified electors must sign this petition before it becomes effective.

The amendment, which is proposed shall be voted upon in said special election, provide as follows:

1. One issei representation on the Community Council on an equal basis with nisei.
2. One issei councilman and one nisei councilman to be elected from each ward.
3. Election of two

block delegates (one issei and one nisei) from each block who shall have the following duties: To meet with ward councilmen for the purpose of keeping them informed of the problems of the residents of the block. 4. The five block representatives from each block who convene for the purpose of nominating ward councilmen as provided in Section II, Article I of By Laws of the Tule Lake Relocation Project, shall meet on a block basis as a nominating committee to select the candidates for the office of block delegates.

## D. OF COLUMBIA CIO GROUP BACKS RELOCATION PLAN

The Washington Industrial Union Council, representing all CIO unions in the District of Columbia, went on record last week in favor of the relocation program and condemned the recent activities of the Dies Committee on Un-American Activities as "irresponsible, hindering the

prosecution of the war, and--by pitting one group of people against another--deliberately promoting the false Nazi doctrines of race," according to a copy of a resolution received by Director Myer.

"The position taken by the union in its resolution was this: The employment of evacuees outside relocation centers helps to utilize more fully the nation's manpower during the war against fascism and 'sustains the democratic rights of residents of this land.' The resolution also welcomed into membership evacuees who are working in the District of Columbia.

The resolution states that copies will be sent to Senator Chandler and Senator Keynolds. (Con't on page 3)

## Convictions Of Hirabayashi, Yasui Upheld By Court

The Supreme Court Monday upheld the convictions of Gordon K. Hirabayashi and Minoru Yasui, American citizens of Japanese ancestry, for violating evacuation and curfew orders of the United States Army, it was revealed in a recent press release.

Chief Justice Harlan F. Stone handed down the decision on behalf of an unanimous court. It appeared to uphold fully the emergency power of the United States military commanders to evacuate, or, otherwise restrict, the activities of

persons whose presence in defense zones they consider detrimental to the war effort.

Stone warned, however, that the court must guard carefully against misuse of such power, and that "when the danger is (Con't. on page 3)

### THIS WEEK MARKS

...the first anniversary for the evacuees from the War Relocation Authority Center, situated near the city of North Sacramento. They filled the open blocks in Ward 1, and then occupied Ward 2 and most of Ward 3.

Celebrations were had in some of the mess halls in observance of one year's service. However, most blocks didn't even notice the passage of time.

Looking back over our first year of Project life brings many nostalgic memories to one's thoughts. How can we ever forget the hostile air between the North West and California people? And those "Come on now," "Get you down," "Waste time," "Mean kind, that kind" (with Hawaiian accent), "Check that," "All shot," "Dummy up," and the most recent "Get it!" and others--how can we forget?

### WITH SO MANY

...persons relocating, the DISPATCH staff finds itself short-handed and with many new faces. From the original staff of about 7, Kunio Otani is the lone survivor. Of the 6 War Relocators who joined the staff last year, only Jobo and yours truly remain. None of the Arbogasts of last year are left on the staff. From the group of 10 from the Pinedale Center, just Masao Saito is left. Among others remaining from last year are Mas Inada, Hideo Shintaku and Harry Inukai.

The Japanese section of the staff has seen much changes. From the original staff of T. Hashida, S. Fukui, and Mary Oshiro only Mary remains. Many others have come and gone in both the English and Japanese Sections.

And it is interesting to note that as more and more go out, the number of girls on the staff has proportionately increased.

## HAMPERING RELOCATION

Certain elements in this project are hampering the relocation movement. They make it their duty to check up on all who are leaving and then make a baseline to their parents, trying to dissuade their sons or daughters from going out. Then they corner the prospective relocatee and harangue at the poor victim for hours about the disadvantages and "danger" of going out.

Yes, there are some disadvantages on the outside. BUT, have they ever stopped to think of the disadvantages of confined life--life behind barbed wires with limited educational and recreational facilities and no family privacy? The most important institution, namely family tie, is lost in this routine camp life.

As long as we remain confined in the various Projects the disadvantages of the outside shall remain. Ignorance of the Caucasians concerning the Japanese-Americans is our chief drawback. To overcome this we must go out and assimilate ourselves in their society. Live among them and talk to them. Only by so doing can we break down the barriers.

"The CIO is not blind to the historical fact that the political persecution of certain groups is the invariable prelude to the infringement of the rights of other broader groups."

(Continued from Page 1) past the restrictions imposed on them should be promptly removed and their freedom of action fully restored."

Stone said the charges against Hirabayashi of disobeying the curfew had no "constitutional infirmity."

Hirabayashi was sentenced to only three months imprisonment, but the heavier penalty was ordered against Yasui on grounds he had lost his American citizenship by reason of several trips back to Japan and other factors.

Stone said the question of Yasui surrendering his citizenship should not have been brought up in the present proceedings, and that a new sentence should be imposed on him in that light.

"There is not much left for me to do but go to the federal road camp and serve whatever sentence is imposed on me," declared Minour Yasui, 26-year-old American-born Japanese lawyer, when apprised Monday of the action of the Supreme Court.

"Like General MacArthur, I would say let's get on with the war now."
