(From the Brethren Relocation Hostel, 3435 W. Van Buren Street, Chicago 24, Illinois, comes the following messages from three ex-Tuleans who relocated via the hostel and by one of the persons in charge.--Editor.)

It's not all east out here, no. It's warm weather, yes. But we invite you to come or to send your son or daughter to this hostel; and that, right away. The longer he stays in a center, the more out of touch with the world he becomes, and the more soft and easy-going in body and mind. The longer he waits, the more difficult it will be for him ever to get back into the stream of life. Are you being fair to him if you keep him another year in a center?

Children usually come to a closer appreciation and understanding of their parents after they have been away from home for a little. A short time apart does not need to separate your family, but can and probably will bring it even more closely together. We will hope that you can join your children outside before very long.

At this hostel they take perfect care of boys and girls until they find school or work and suitable housing. If I were the parent of a Nisei son or daughter, I would not hesitate to send my child here.

I fully recommend your children to the Brethren Relocation Hostel here in Chicago because I have been living here and know its operation. The hostel is operated by a Christian Church but all evacuees are welcome to make it their temporary home. Your children staying at the hostel will have three former California teachers as their advisors and their discipline will be watched very closely by the hostel staff. Don't keep your children in camp. Let them come out and plan for their future.

# TULE LAKE PACKING SHED SCENE OF MUCH ACTIVITY

During the past month the vegetables grown on the farm have been amply supplying colony needs and at the same time have been shipped to other relocation centers.

All vegetables which are not distributed to the mess halls are taken to the packing sheds, located south of the project. Due to the fact that the shipping of vegetables has started earlier this year, the men working there have been busier than ever. Already 42 carloads of mixed vegetables have been shipped out to five relocation centers, namely: Gila River Project, Colorado River Project, Manzanar, Minidoka and Topaz.

Upon entering the packing sheds, vegetables of all varieties are stacked up by the hundreds which extends from one end to the other. All these vegetables are brought in by trucks at regular intervals. When the packing begins, these vegetables are wheeled to the sorting tables and to the troughs. After carefully selecting and washing the vegetables, they are put into paper-lined crates with ground ice.

Every step is performed systematically and in an assembly line fashion. Throughout the entire procedure all crates travel on ball-bearing rollers

which leads directly into the box cars. On both sides of the rollers are men who do their specific job. After each individual has contributed his share toward the filling of the crates, then they are rolled under a large electric nailer, which stamps and nails the lid with one impact. From here, the vegetables are rolled into the standard refrigeration cars, where several men await the oncoming of crates to be stacked and iced again.

The ice obtained for this purpose is shipped from Klamath Falls and all this ice is kept in the newly-constructed storage room. Since the ice comes in large cakes, it is first broken down and ground by several electric ice grinders which grind the ice for regular packing use.

Because more and more vegetables are shipped, crates are now being made by proficient box makers. These crates are turned out in rapid succession to meet all needs.

At the present, nearly 100 men are working in both of the packing sheds. Many of whom have been previously employed in packing concerns up and down the Pacific Coast. Therefore, they are highly qualified to do this type of work. It has also been stated that the newer workers have done an equally good job in carrying on their work in such an organized manner.

Credit is also due to the office staff for their fine and efficient work. Through the combined efforts and cooperation of these people, the shipping program of Tule Lake has been made a huge success.

### ERRORS COSTLY FOR LOSER
