### SUMIO HORIO AND ENKOJI LEAD CHAMPS

After hurling six victories in succession, veteran Hank Nakatomi, after winning Saturday, could not stand the iron-man role of pitching two days in a row and was knocked out of the box in the early innings to give Hillmen the City Major Hardball League Championship, 12-7, Sunday afternoon on field #1. John Horio was on the mound for the winners and pitched a five well-scattered hit game.

Without wasting any time, the champions started off in high gear and pounded out six runs in the first three innings while West Sacramento could not put up any sort of retaliation.

The losers draw blood in the fourth on untimely errors committed on the part of the champions when Ogata and Tominaga took advantage and scored. The following inning found two more again as Suzuki and Uno spiked the plate on Daijogo's sacrifice followed by Kimoto's bingle.
