## CASABA FANS WARNED

"By continued vandalism and horseplay of spectators of the basketball games last week, the use of the gymnasium for the center athletes may be prohibited," warned Haruo Yamamoto, athletic director of the recreation department.

## TULE LAKE

### CO-OP DECLARES REFUND OF 10.9% TO PATRONS

Meeting on October 21, the Board of Directors of the local Cooperative Enterprises decided to declare patronage refunds amounting to 10.9% of the patronage record of each member for the period covering June 1 to September 30 in the form of Certificate of Indebtedness.

It was necessary for the Co-op to pay the refunds in the form of certificates in order to provide sufficient working capital and these will be redeemed when enough funds are available for that purpose. However, before the new certificates can be paid off,

the certificates issued for the period ending June 1 must be redeemed.

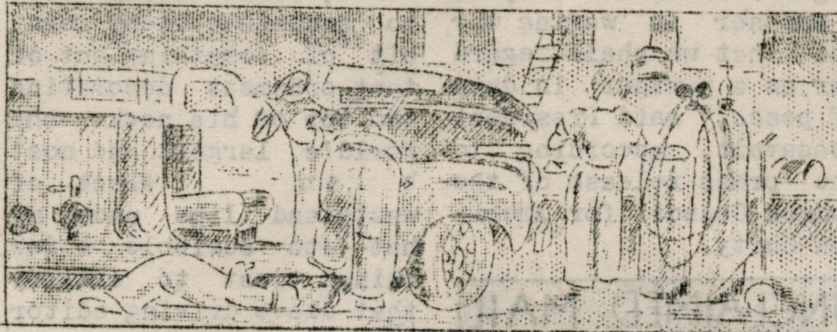

# CHINESE IMMIGRATION BILL PENDING BEFORE CONGRESS

Opposing the Magnuson bill to relax the immigration ban on Chinese and permit naturalization of legal Chinese residents, Representative Elmer, Republican of Missouri, debated on the house floor with an "America for Americans" plea, according to the Seattle Post-Intelligencer.

In answering opponents of this measure, Magnuson maintained that by permitting 105 Chinese to enter the United States annually on a quota basis, the Japanese claims of racial discrimination based on Oriental exclusion can be counteracted.

"We have talked a great deal in platitudes and generalities regarding our feelings toward our allies and how the Allies are going to rebuild this world. This is the first time since the war began that we have an opportunity to do something concrete about it, and toward the most valiant ally of all," said Representative Magnuson, Democrat of Washington, in the house during debate on his bill, reported the Seattle paper.

"The enactment of legislation now pending before the Congress would put Chinese immigrants on a parity with those from other countries. The Chinese quota would, therefore, be only about 100 immigrants a year. There can be no reasonable apprehension that any such number of immigrants will cause unemployment or provide competition in the search for jobs. The extensions of the privileges of citizenship to the relatively few Chinese residents in our country

would operate as another meaningful display of friendship. It would be additional proof that we regard China not only as a partner in waging war but that we shall regard her as a partner in days of peace," said President Roosevelt, according to the press release of the Common Council for American Unity.

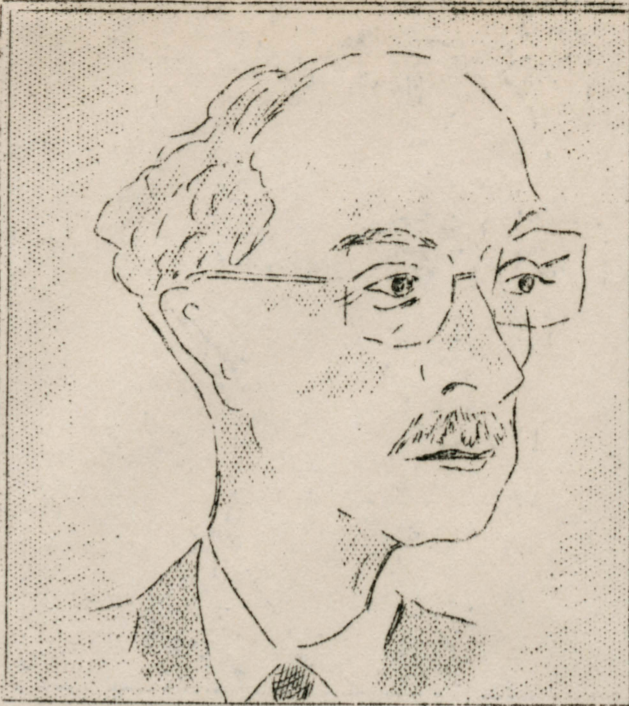

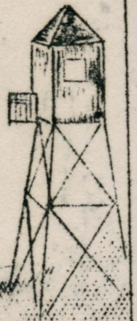
