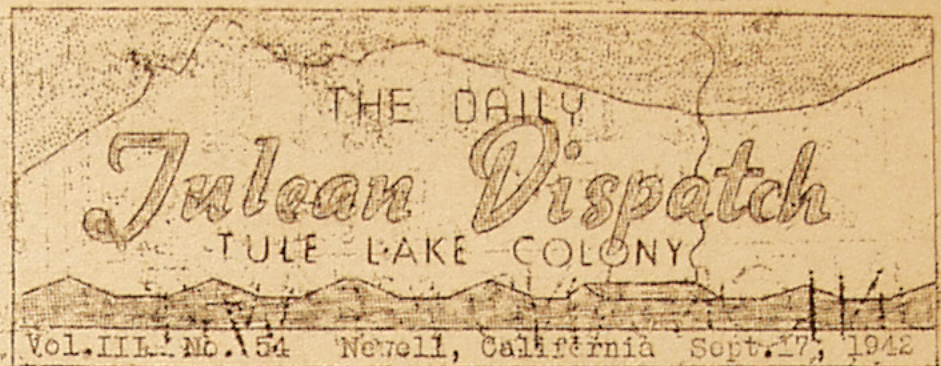


## CALLING FOR "DAISY".....

# To Elect Fair Practice Body

In accordance with the Administrative Instruction No. 27, on the subject of employment and compensation, issued by the director of J.R.A. on Sept. 1, election will be held here 7:30 p.m. Friday, Sept. 18, by seven Work Corps groups to select seven members of the Fair Practice Committee.

All employed evacuees are automatically members of the Work Corps. The F. P. Committee will hear complaints from workers.

The block managers of the blocks in which the group meetings are held will preside. There must be at least five nominations, in oral form, before the nominations may be closed. Voting shall be by secret ballot.

The meeting locations follow:

1. Agricultural employees - #1620

2. Industrial & public works employees - #1720

This group includes all construction, coal, maintenance, furniture, packing shed, etc., employees.

3. Mess employees - #1920

Because of the large number of mess employees, only five representatives from each block should attend the meeting in order that there may be adequate room. Each mess hall should select its five representatives before Friday evening.

4. Professional employees - #2420

This includes all doctors, nurses, attorneys, teachers, social workers, and newspaper workers.

5. Civic and administrative employees - #2520

This includes all secretaries, stenographers, clerks, wardens, firemen, block managers, and recreation employees.

6. Transportation and warehousing employees - #2620

7. Women Employees - #2720, 8:30 p.m.

This group includes all women, who are members of the Work Corps, regardless of the capacity in which they are employed. This special group was created so that there would be at

least one woman representative on the Fair Practice Committee. In order that women employees may also attend any other group meetings for which they are eligible, the women's meeting will not be held at #2720 until 8:30 p.m.

## PLANNING BOARD IS PROPOSED

# Mess 48 Rated Best

Kitchen 48 rates as the best kitchen of the week in the report made to Project Director by the Project Steward. This was the only kitchen that met all standards of cleanliness, sanitation and mess management.

The report indicated that cooks in kitchen after kitchen were not following menus, were using canned vegetables rather than peel and prepare fresh vegetables, and were not putting fresh milk into refrigerators after each use.

In several instances supplies of fresh vegetables were deliberately put into garbage cans rather than cook them. Such waste and extravagance are inexcusable.

As a result of this report it has been directed that several kitchen crews be placed on probation and they must be supervised closely until improvement is certain. DIRECTOR SHIRRELL

## FIRE PROTECTION MAN LAUDS TULLELAKE BODY

"The Tule Lake Fire department has an excellent chance of winning the 'efficiency award', to be presented to the top-notch fire department of all projects in the western U.S. The men making-up the department can be held as a model of what can be done!" This was the statement of William E. Hoffman, fire protection officer of the relocation centers, in an interview with DISPATCH.

Hoffman, on tour of the projects, praised the fine record established by the Fire department here and voiced commendations on the splendid work maintained by the Fire Prevention Group.

"The major cause of fires here were directly or indirectly through structural weaknesses and not through any laxity of the educational program. This community of 16,000 people, is the second largest project in the United States, but the per-capita loss due to fires is the lowest in any community, of this size, in the whole nation," Hoffman declared.

The San Francisco regional office will determine the judging of the fire departments in the projects and the 'award' will be based on the records established by the respective fire departments, it was indicated.

## CHANGE IN BASE HOSPITAL STAFF HINTED

After a few days visit with the Base hospital, Dr. G. D. Carlyle Thompson, regional medical officer, left for San Francisco Monday night.

Dr. Thompson's visit to the Project accomplished several things. He addressed various groups of the hospital staff including doctors, dentists, nurses as well as holding meetings with hospital and health dept. personnel.

Dr. Thompson pointed out that the situation here was no different, in fact in many instances much better than conditions found in many communities throughout the United States.

Dr. Carson, chief medical officer, stated that it was evident from Dr. Thompson's statements that some changes in personnel of the hospital will be necessary. This not only applies to doctors but also to other professional personnel. The object of such a move is to provide the most efficient service for all Japanese evacuees in the centers with the most efficient medical care possible.

Stressed also was the fact that procurement problems here were no different from any other project. This hospital obtains supplies on the same basis as any standard army hospital in the United States.
