The W.R.A. will move such household and personal

effects provided the ovacuee, at his own expense, makes arrangement to have his household and personal effects moved from their present place of storage to a central receiving warehouse.

The location of such a warehouse will be designated by the WRA, and the name, address and location of such warehouse will be supplied as soon as arrangements have been made.

The Central receiving station is made necessary by the fact that trains will only transport a full carload of goods.

If a car cannot be filled, the goods will lay idle until sufficient amount have accumulated to fill up the car.
