WRA To Move Private Property

PERSONAL EFFECTS TRANSFERRED FROM CENTRAL POINT TO COLONY

Household goods and personal effects, left in private storages, will be moved to relocation center, it was announced in a bulletin issued from the San Francisco office.

The W.R.A. will move such household and personal effects provided the evacuee, at his own expense, makes arrangement to have his household and personal effects moved from their present place of storage to a central receiving warehouse.

The location of such a warehouse will be designated by the WRA, and the name, address and location of such warehouse will be supplied as soon as arrangements have been made.

The Central receiving station is made necessary by the fact that trains will only transport a full carload of goods.

If a car cannot be filled, the goods will lay idle until sufficient amount have accumulated to fill up the car.

Household and personal effects which may be shipped are defined as such articles of household furniture, kitchen equipment and utensils and clothing normally used in connection with daily life.

The cost of transportation from the central warehouse to the Project will be borne by the WRA.
