Another assurance that the report a bill depriving the Japanese-Americans of their citizenship status had been adopted by the House of Representatives was a false alarm was received by Director Elmer L. Shirrell from Philip M. Glick, WRA solicitor, in Washington yesterday afternoon.

The exact copy of the telegram from Glick is as follows:

"Am sending you this wire at request of Acting Regional Director Rowalt.

"I understand that rumors are circulating at Tule Lake that Congress has adopted a bill abolishing citizenship status of Nisei and another bill providing for internment of evacuees. These rumors are not true.

"They are probably due to a misunderstanding of a bill recently introduced in Senate to amend the Constitution to permit Congress to regulate conditions under which persons subject to dual citizenship may become citizens of the United States; that bill has not passed.

"It has merely been introduced in Senate and referred to a committee. It would take a two thirds vote in each house of Congress and ratification by three fourths of the State legislatures to adopt such a constitutional amendment. Congress has not adopted any legislation that would deprive evacuees of citizenship would provide for their internment.

"THE WAR RELOCATION AUTHORITY RECOGNIZES AND WILL DEFEND THE CITIZENSHIP RIGHTS OF THOSE EVACUEES BORN IN THE UNITED STATES.

"You are authorized to inform the evacuees of the contents of this telegram!

FIRE CHIEF WARNS RESIDENTS

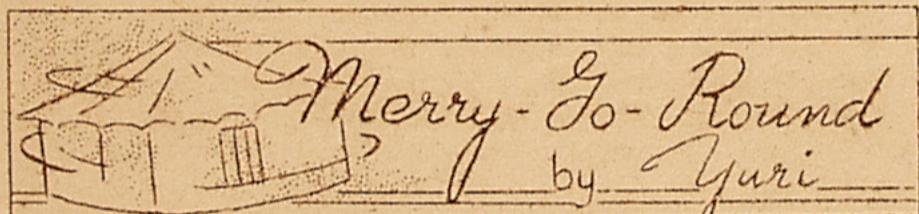
FIRE CHIEF Says:
