FIRE INSPECTORS CHECK BARRACKS

Launching a house-to-house campaign, 36 fire inspectors are visiting each barrack in the project to check on the fire hazards in operating the coal heaters.

Colonists are advised to not have any permanent fixture within three feet of the stove; open the damper and draft in the stoves when starting the fire, but adjust the damper after coal is burning steadily; and take good care of issued fire fighting equipment such as buckets and ladders.

INCORPORATION PAPERS SIGNED BY CO-OP BOARD

LEGAL DOCUMENT TO BE FILED WITH SECRETARY OF STATE

Legal steps for formal recognition of Tule Lake Project's Cooperative organization as a corporation were taken Tuesday, 2 p.m. when an incorporation paper was signed by the 15 members of the Board of Incorporators. This legal document will be filed with the Secretary of State of California. With the filing of this document, the cooperative will be recognized as a corporation.

LIBRARY WILL BE CLOSED EVENINGS

Suye Hayashi, librarian, states that the public library will be closed evenings, starting October 13, until adequate lighting and heating is provided.

The by-laws, which governs the function of the co-op, are being redrafted and revised at the present time by the by-law committee, preparatory to presentation to all the wards for approval.

The by-laws in its final form will be presented to the general assembly of all co-op representatives for adoption.

The fifteenth member of the Board of Incorporator is Harold S. Jacoby who was elected from the Caucasian members of the co-op.

Regular ward meetings are being held every Thursday to hear reports by various committees on their work.

AMPLIFICATION MADE ON MIYAMOTO-TAKETA REPORT

Additional information and amplification of the facts about the Sunio Miyamoto-Masao Taketa report on working conditions of the evacuee workers in the various regions are as follows:

1. HOUSING: (DISPATCH stated: "FSA camps are mobile and are made up of tents. - - -")

FSA camps are of two types: permanent, and mobile units. Those of the permanent type are built just like army barracks, and better than these we have here. Rent for these are \$1.00 per week, or 2 hours' work for the camp. Board at the Caldwell camp has been tentatively set at \$1.00 per day by the administrators; but this figure is subject to revision depending upon actual costs. There are rumors that board will probably amount to about 75¢ per day. There is also a charge of 50¢ per week for fuel, consisting of coal and wood.

2. Mobile units consists of tents with double cloth, and erected on board foundations. These tents are small, area insufficient, and those living in them are really cramped for space. These mobile units are now at Nyssa and Vale. Rent for these tents are \$1.00 per week, or 2 hour's work for the camp. Board, however, is being charged at the rate of 75¢ per day; and the Amalgamated Sugar Company has been giving the residents all the fuel they desired for nothing.

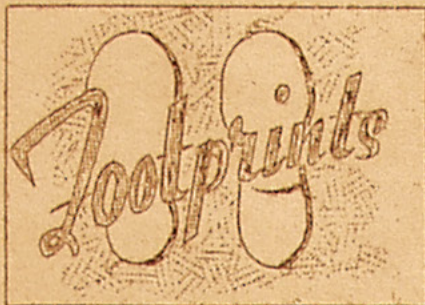
3. CAN'T MAKE MONEY: (DISPATCH stated: "One exception: he worked hard and earned \$100 in a week.")

One exception was a fellow who worked for 14 days and made \$120 net. A young fellow, about 17, at Nyssa camp claims to have made as high as \$12.00 in a day digging potatoes at 10¢ per sack.

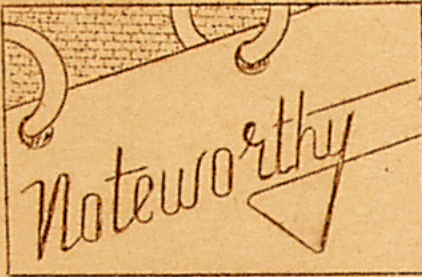

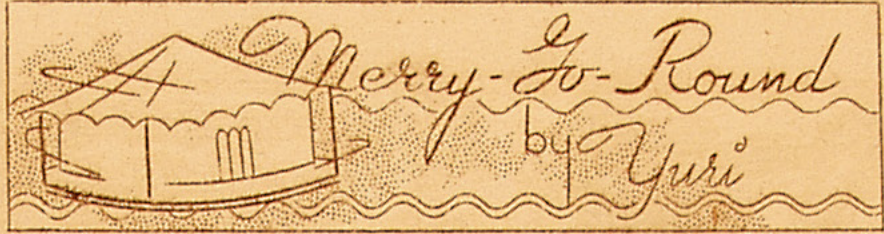

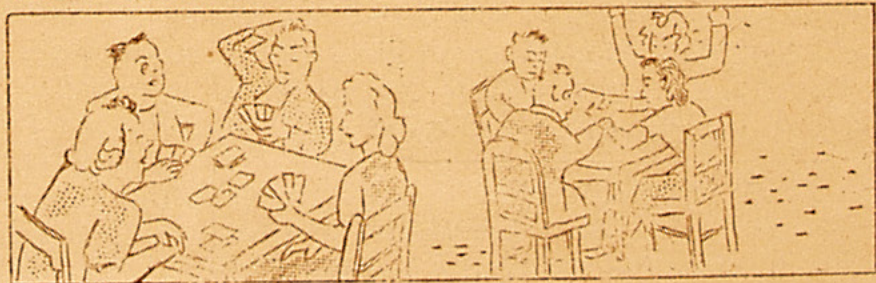
ROMANCE NEWS
