SANITARY CONDITION HERE FAVORABLE, ENGINEER SAYS

To inspect and make recommendations on the sanitary situation at the Tule Lake Project, Robert T. Lowe, acting regional sanitary engineer from S. F. was here this week.

Lowe revealed that conditions here on the whole were good, with the exception of a few problems, which include the butcher shop and the gar-

bage disposal. He strongly recommended closer coordination between the hospital laboratory and the Sanitary Corps, especially in regards to the Imhoff-tank operation.

Lowe ran a number of bacteriological tests and found the water conditions here favorable, but the sewage ponds and canals highly contaminated.

HUNTER DIES IN PROJECT HOSPITAL

The first casualty of the hunting season, William D. Jones, 27, Tienista, Calif., died Thursday at the Base Hospital here.

Jones had returned from hunting to Tienista about 12:30 noon, and was relating the story of his trip before a group of friends.

A revolver, which he was twirling in his hand, accidentally went off, firing a shot into his groin.

Since the Project hospital was the nearest, he was brought here in an ambulance. He died on the way.

Jones was employed as a mechanic by the Shaw Lumber Co. of Tienista.

オレゴン州二イサアには収容所を出所して就労してゐる人達が多数居る、其の二イサアの有志がソートリーキ及他の収容所を出所就労する人達を歓迎し且つ其他の住民との相互間の親睦を計るべき努力をしようといふ決議を去る、日本夜二イサア高校の公用室で有志大会を催した、此会には附近農業家並組合代理人々、米画職業組合代表、郡々市司法役員、ワイルド、カルド空手、ウエイク、ペイント、マーシン、オード、メリック、キヤンヨン、ワシントン各郡公エイケルソン、セア、マレニア、セミル、ホートラード、オニタリオ各郡市公エオルゴン州本部アンソントレーキ(スミスコム)二イサア、D.A.キヤン、カルドウエル農園者キヤンアより定住してある日本人講師も来会した。

ウエイク、カーン氏が此の大会の議長である。此の大会の決議文は農務大臣、W.P.A.本部長、ソルトレーキ、マクサナ、エデン、デルク、バーカー、サカトノ、スミス各收容所食糧及オレゴン、アイダホ各州知事に送附した由。大会に出席した七郡に於て重要な農産物收穫に當労者が絶対に参加せりと述べられ、在の通り決議す。

本会の主旨は收容所外に在る日本人統一農業に貢献して從事して居る日本人又は他のW.P.A.会員の目的精神と合致する事等が仕事に対する、当面としては速に出所就労する日本人の生活やその保護を目的とした日本人に於ける個々の問題に於ける援助等である。

斯様な事により、我々は日本人機運者と当面の生活社会復興の糸全件として、より親切を期して、常に行動を續けられるであらう。

RE: THEATRE BUILDING

ARGUMENTS FOR AND AGAINST CONSTRUCTION GIVEN PRELIMINARY TO REFERENDUM VOTING

OPINION AGAINST THE THEATER CONSTRUCTION:

1. We do not see the necessity of building a theater. America is now facing the greatest crisis in her history, and naturally because of that the WRA should not build a theater. Why should we spend thousands of dollars for purely recreational purposes? What will the American public think when it hears of it?

2. Now that the Coop. Incorporation papers have been signed as per the Tulean Dispatch of the 15th, it is an added reason against the Theater construction.

It is only sound business practice to have a cash reserve to fall back on, and we want a good reserve when Mr. Kendall Smith hands over the Community Enterprises to the Coop. Furthermore the cash reserve might be useful in an emergency in the Community for which the WRA has no provisions. This reserve will be gone if the theater is built.

3. A fifteen cent admission charge is equivalent to 1/3 our daily pay...it is entirely too high. This economic angle is of the utmost importance to the average family here, because they have had to sacrifice so much in the first place. Since coming here we have been forced by need to buy many things, whereby depleting what little cash we had. It is only fair to base everything on the standard of our least fortunate people.

4. We do not know when this war will end, but we must consider and provide for that day. We should have enough to take us back to our home town or any other desirable place to start again.

When the last war ended many Germans who were in similar camps were told that they were free to go...but many had to remain near their former camps and farm for a living.

5. Now the WRA policy is to encourage all persons from this project to relocate to outside areas as is possible. In view of this the continued patronage of a theater by many hardly seems possible.

6. In conclusion, at an average 10¢ admission this will figure from a capacity house of 800, 3 times a day, will amount in one year to the astonishing total of \$86,400.00. This is too great an economic burden for us to long stand up under, and therefore considering all the various reasons stated we are unalterably opposed to this theater construction.

ABOVE OPINIONS EXPRESSED BY COMMITTEE REPRESENTING 32 BLOCKS REFERRED TO THE THEATER CONSTRUCTION.

ARGUMENTS FOR THE THEATER CONSTRUCTION:

The people here will shortly be asked by referendum to determine whether or not they want a motion picture theater.

You may be told by opponents that this theater will be too expensive. In addition, wild rumors concerning costs have been circulated.

The Community Council recently appointed a committee to investigate the costs. Their report follows:

1. Labor and material	\$4,000.00
Labor	650.00
2 Projectors and accessories	3,750.00
	\$8,400.00

2. First-run pictures, carefully selected on basis of entertaining and educational value, will be shown. No picture offensive to the Japanese or propaganda will be shown. Also, Japanese sound pictures will be shown.

3. Film rental is upon admission percentage.

4. Prices: children, 5¢; adults, 15¢; but after initial is paid, there will be further reductions in admission.

5. The Project Education Department from time to time will obtain films of an educational nature, and these will be shown to the children in conjunction with their school work. No admission need be charged for these events.

In addition, the following facts must be borne in mind in voting intelligently on this measure:

1. The initial outlay of \$8,400.00 from the Co-op surplus means an average outlay per person of only 5¢.

2. This initial outlay will be paid back by theater-goers.

3. The theater building will seat 800 persons and may be used for the production of Japanese plays and dramas or as a community auditorium.

4. The WRA has definitely stated that due to wartime restrictions they will not build a theater.

5. The Co-op has been incorporated, and its affairs will be managed by Japanese Board of Directors. The theater will likewise be managed by Japanese directors, and its policies will be for the best interest of the colonists at all times.

The Community Council, after careful consideration of the foregoing facts, voted three to one in favor of the theater.

IF YOU AGREE THAT THE THEATER IS A DESIRABLE AND NECESSARY MEDIUM FOR THE EDUCATION AND RECREATION OF THE COLONISTS, BE SURE TO VOTE "YES" ON THE REFERENDUM. THIS IS YOUR LAST AND ONLY OPPORTUNITY TO HAVE A THEATER.

四、我々は何時戰室が終るか予測出来ない、而し我々は其前の来る工を考へて準備しなければなりません。我々は從前之仕事又は希望する地に得る費用と町のスタートするに足るものは持つてゐない。前世界大戰が終つた時、多くのドイツ人は我々を嫌なキャンプに遣たが、今更に出でする様にそこはれた時、多くの慈善はキャンプの附近に運び奉業を過ぎ生計を立てたとの工である。此の工より察して劇場を維持する工に慈善の趣らしい工が起る可能性がある。

六、結論として平均十九仙の入场料で八百人を収容して一日三回、二千人入场料が八千六千四百串といふ額をべきねを示す、此に対する経済盈餘は我々には大き過ぎて耐へられまい。以て此の金がの理由によつて考へてみると、此の劇場建設には依然として反対するものである。

以上が主論は三十六回、ヨリノ劇場建設反対參軍會の意見書である。
