An additional 25 persons with some college education are wanted as coders. All will receive prelimiinstructions from Miss Evelyn Rose, who has been sent here from the San Francisco office set up this new unit.

As the Regional headquarters for the coding of the Individual Records the Tule Lake office will be sent these records from the other mine relocation projects. The work is estimated to continue for six months with approximately 110,000 records being coded. The coded forms will be sent to San Francisco for use in transfer of information to the punch cards.

After completion of the coding, there will be a staff retained for statistical analysis, and so experience in valuable statistical work can be gained.

Those interested in the work are requested to apply at the Records Office, 801-A, as soon as possible. Persons unable to apply during working hours may be interviewed personally by Miss Rose between 12 noon and 12:45 p.m. on Thursday and Friday of this week.

Father Dai visited the mayor, school superintendent, postmaster and other officials while in Kent. They all asked the genial Kent Pastor to reassure the former Japanese residents of their goodwill.

In expressing his opinion on the farm situation,
Father Dai said the farm situation was sad. "Bean

poles and pea poles were still standing and very few people could be seen working on the fields," the Tule Lette paster disclosed. "Consequently vegetables are scarce and very high priced as can be evidenced by the cost of one cucumber some 15 cents." Incidentally, eggs cost over 60 cents a dozen and a shave and a haircut set customer back a cuto \$1.25 on the outside mar-

Father Dai in disclosing certain facts to the colonists stated that prices on every commodity are sky-high and priorities make horetofore necessities an impossibility to buy. "Money cannot buy the things that could be purchased in pro-war days and the prices of purchasable goods make high tages a necessity," Father Kitagawa added.

It was Father Dai's belief that people in WRA projects are not as ba d off as many of the colonists make themselves believe. Kimmy Watanabe, who was with Father Dai on his Northwest visit, declared that he was sincerely glad to be back at Tule Lake.
