LAWS TO BE SUBMITTED TO WARDS FOR APPROVAL

The By-Law Committee which has been drafting the by-laws governing the operation of Tule Lake's cooperative organization submitted their report to the Board of Incorporators for approval Monday night when the board convened at #1608. The by-laws will be presented to the ward representatives for ward approval. Final approval, however, will rest with the new members of the cooperative.

The membership fee in the co-op has been set at \$1.00 and all those above 18 years of age are eligible to join the cooperative. Each new member will be given a certificate of interest representing a book value of \$2. The certificate of interest is the individual share on the accumulated profit of the community enterprise which totaled \$15,554.83.

In keeping with the co-op principle of equality, no member shall be given more than one certificate of interest. The membership will be returned to any member leaving the Project. When the community enterprise is liquidated, the certificate will be redeemed at book value determined by the Board of Directors.

CABARET TICKETS ON SALE SOON

Tickets to the cabaret "Cafe International" will be on sale soon in accordance with wards. As the show travels to a ward tickets will be distributed and allotted to all block managers in that ward for sale "as long as they last".

The nominal sum for charged admission is to defray expenses inherent with the production.

Patronage refund will be declared at regular intervals.

The WRA advisor, to be appointed by Project Director Shirrell, will act as a liaison officer between the Co-op and the WRA. He will see to it that the co-op is financially sound and operated in accord with the agreement between the two organizations.

The actual management of the community enterprise will be left solely to the co-op Board of Directors.

COUNCIL HOLDS CURT MEETING

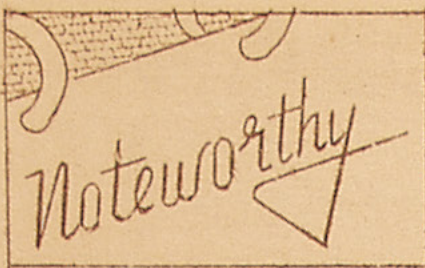

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FOOTBALL RULES CONTINUED

7. The league games will be played regardless of the weather, rain or shine.

8. Each team must furnish one football for the league game. Preferably leather. If not leather, a rubber football may be used upon agreement of the two managers.

9. Players' list may be increased but no player may be added who previously has played in any Senior or Junior team, as the case may be, in the league.

10. PROTESTS:

a. Protest must be made to the umpire or referee at the time of the disputed play, and the game played under protest by the manager protesting the contest.

b. Protest must be written by the respective manager and brought into the Recreational Center, 1808, addressed to Seibo Fujii, Football Commissioner, within 24 hours after the game.

c. Football commissioner will settle all disputes, decide all league questions and conduct all other league affairs. He will be assisted by the members of the Recreational football committee.

SHEET ROCK INSULATION TO BE COMPLETED SOON

Sheet-rock insulation of every apartment in the Colony will be completed by the end of this week, Construction officials indicated. The gigantic project involving use of 2,600,000 square feet of insulating boards and employing 500 men at its peak of operation--was completed in three months.

With each six men crew lining two apartments per day, the walls and ceilings of 1024 barracks were insulated. Kenneth Kuroko's squad was judged as the top-notch crew for speed and efficiency. Overtime labor has also been put in by the squad since its inception, it was further disclosed.

Those directing the project were supervisors: Harry Katsurama, Hiro U-zatru and Richard Kondo; assisted by field men: Akira Yokomichi and Harry Fujita.

Commendations were voiced by Project officials as the completion was neared.
