Thousands surged back and forth on the firebreak last Saturday in the daffiest, liveliest joyfest ever staged in the Colony. Enthusiasm percolated early in the morning and boiled all the way until the final curtain fell at the Masquerade ball. Although the entire parade was on foot to conserve tire and gasoline, it carried color and gaiety in rich splendor.

Ingenuity went to no end even with facilities lacking. All stands were erected with crude lumber borrowed from the construction department but crepe paper decorations and attractive presentation made up for it. Games and prizes were skillfully created.

Hamburgers sold out completely in the middle of the afternoon and pop corn and peanut concessions were closed down by 4:30 p. m. U.C. club's art studio kept its five artists busy all afternoon even after the booth was dismantled around them.
