

Application for CAA Certificate Renewals Accepted

Evanees who hold Civilian Aeronautics Administration pilots' or aircraft mechanics' certificates and who wish their renewal or reissuance, should make personal application to the CAA, it was learned here this week. The CAA announced last April that it would review the cases of Japanese Americans holding CAA certificates with a view toward confirming or reissuing such certificates, but in a recent memorandum sent to Guy Robertson, project director, it was stated that final action would not be taken unless personal application is made.

Foreign Property Report Exemptions Revealed

Residents who, on May 1, 1943, owned or had any interest, direct or indirect, in foreign property, are advised by Fred Miyasato of the project attorney's office, that they need not file reports on such property if (1) they own property in more than one foreign country and the valuation of said property is less than \$10,000 in terms of United States dollars, or if (2) they own property in one foreign country and the valuation of said property is less than \$1,000. However, if they own any bonds, patent license agreements, trademark agreements, franchise or concession agreements, no matter how small the value or interest, they must file a report of their holdings by November 1, 1943. Reports may be made individually or through the project attorney's office located in the Sentinel building.

OPA Gives Evacuees Equal Shoe Ration Privilege

Instructions covering shoe rationing from the Office of Price Administration entitles evacuees to the same privileges of shoe rationing as found in any other American community, Victor J. Ryan, budget finance officer, disclosed. Evacuees are allowed one pair of shoes for each rationing period and are not required to establish their needs for stamps in advance. Stamps are being issued at the shoe rationing desk in the Administration Building. The present ration period is from June 15 to October 31.
