

Payment of C. E. Refunds to Start Tomorrow

Payment of refunds amounting to \$7,314.19 will be made beginning Thursday at 14-25-S; Thomas T. Sashihara, chairman of the community enterprises board of trustees, announced. With the \$16,603.70 refunded last April, the payment will total \$23,917.89.

Current payments will be made in coupons which may be used as cash at all community enterprises stores and services. Certificates of indebtedness amounting to \$65,827.63 will be issued for the balance due each patron. These certificates will be redeemed at a later date by cash payments, probably in two or three installments, according to Sashihara.

Sashihara explained that the trustees are restricted by WRA regulations to pay not more than 25 per cent of net earnings at any one time. He also stated that earnings represent the only capital the trustees have to work with because no capital was raised by the sale of memberships as in other centers. Through local arrangements every resident who saves and turns in cash register receipts shares in the earnings and no one is obliged to buy a membership to obtain his share, Sashihara said.

Residents are requested to call for their refunds between 1:30-4:30 p.m. It is important that residents bring with them the receipts issued at the time their cash register receipts were turned in, Sashihara stated. The schedule follows:

Aliens Warned by Project Attorney

A warning was issued by the project attorney's office reminding aliens that when out on leave they must keep in contact with the nearest U. S. attorney general's office and that they must have permission from the attorney general's office before moving from one place to another.

Project attorney John McGowan cites the recent case of several alien evacuees, including two from Heart Mountain, in Idaho on seasonal leave who ran into difficulties because they did not heed the ruling.

They were picked up by the FBI and were sent to the internment camp in Missoula, Mont., because they did not have permission to go from Idaho to Spokane.

McGowan revealed that it took much communication between the local project attorney's office, the attorney general's office in Spokane and WRA officials in Washington D. C. to get the matter straightened out.

Printing Company Representative to Be Here Monday

Takayoshi Karakane, representing the Cuneo Press, Inc. of Chicago, will be at the outside employment office from November 15 to recruit 100 or more nisei.

The company is engaged in printing and binding magazines and books. Twenty nisei are already employed. A 35-room hotel, 5½ miles from the plant, has been leased to house workers.

First week wages for men are \$27.50 for 50 hours. Pay for second week will be \$34.38. From eighth week, pay will be \$36.85. Wages for women will be 50 cents per hour for 40 hours, with fourth week pay at 55 cents per hour. Forty hours a week are guaranteed, with occasional overtime at time and a half.
