Three-Day Heart Mountain Institute Starts Tomorrow

William McKee, director of the midwest office for the American Friends Service committee in Chicago; Dr. Floyd Sampson, professor of religion, University of Denver; Vivian R. Archambault, Denver YWCA, an authority on minority problems and a long time "Y" worker; Masao Satow, nisei representative of the national YMCA council; and Dorthea Spellman, faculty member of Denver University in the school of social work, will participate in the Heart Mountain Institute which begins here tomorrow (Friday) and will continue through Sunday under the sponsorship of the national YMCA and YWCA, it was announced by the relocation committee.

From 10 a.m. tomorrow morning the visiting leaders will start the program with a meeting with the local PTA group. In the afternoon, high school students will hear the various speakers, followed by a planning meeting in the evening at the USO lounge, 23-25. Various community leaders will be present at this meeting.

On Saturday, the team will address the block managers and councilmen, appointed personnel; youth leaders, and members of the social welfare department.

Sunday will find the speakers divided up to attend various morning and evening services of both the Buddhist and Christian churches, while at 1 p.m. there will be a general meeting at the Pagoda theater in block 29.

Additional Students Taken in Adult Classes

All day and night adult education classes will continue to meet in the regularly assigned places, Walter C. Schlosser, adult education director, announced in correcting the impression of some people that classes were terminated. All classes are continuing as before and students may still enroll. Day classes are now operating in sewing, artificial flower design, crochet, embroidery, and fine arts. Night classes are being conducted in English, fine arts, mathematics, electricity, reading, mechanical drawing, chemistry, woodcraft, and the commercial division including shorthand, business English, typing and bookkeeping-accounting. Information relative to these classes may be obtained at the adult education office at the north wing of the high school building.

Classes schedules are listed on the second quarter registration notices which were posted on the bulletin boards in each mess hall. If the subject of your interest is not listed come in and inquire about it, Schlosser said.

Drug and Food Items Received for Japanese Nationals

Word was received from the International committee of the Red Cross, this week, to the effect that 480 kgs of soya sauce, 15 kgs of bon mesh and 2 cases of drugs were scheduled to arrive in the center in the near future for the use of Japanese nationals. These items arrived recently on the M.S. Gripsholm and various quantities have already been distributed to Japanese nationals in various other sections of the United States. The plan for distributing these goods among Japanese nationals within the center is being handled by the community council.
