

Invasion of Europe Begins

Spearheaded by 4,000 ships and 11,000 planes, the invasion of continental Europe began this morning with allied confirmation of landings on the coast of Normandy.

Sneaking across 80 miles from the coast of England, a tactic which caught the enemy by surprise, the air and sea superiority of the allies helped establish beach-heads along 250 miles of the European coast.

The Seine and Channel estuaries have been pierced by allied forces and advance bodies have penetrated 10 to 20 miles inland. Three divisions of Allied paratroopers are reported by German communiques to have landed behind the Hitler lines.

Allied forces have occupied the two channel islands of Jersey and Guernsey which are 80 miles from the coast of Britain.

Significant of the surprise and the thoroughness of the invasion was the lack of serious aerial opposition and sea and underwater obstacles of the Germans.

Chicago Has Not Reached Saturation Point for Resettlement; Kennedy Reports

Rumors circulating in relocation centers to the effect that Chicago has reached the saturation point as far as resettlement is concerned is wholly unfounded, Vernon E. Kennedy, relocation supervisor of the Chicago area, announced. Japanese Americans in metropolitan Chicago represent less than one-tenth of one percent of the population and there is every indication that several times this number of resettlers can find employment and ready community acceptance, Kennedy said.

"It is our observation," he added, "that community and employer acceptance improves with every additional resettler arriving in the city. Housing is easier to find today than it was when the first evacuees arrived a year and a half ago. More and more war plants are daily opening their doors to issei and nisei. Many hundreds of jobs are available through the WRA office and thousands through the cooperation of the U. S. Employment service.

"Chicago extends a welcoming hand to all who wish to come here," Kennedy concluded.

Telegrams Sent to Soldiers Overseas Must Include APO Numbers

Because a score or more parents and relatives this week received telegrams from soldiers who have arrived at their destinations overseas, Maxine Main, supervisor of communications, announced today, that telegrams sent to soldiers must include the APO number. Only the APO number that are listed with Western Union as having sent telegrams can receive them, she said. Birthday greeting and congratulatory telegrams may be sent to soldiers overseas but not to those serving in the continental United States, she added.
