

### Jerome Transferees to Arrive Thursday

According to the present schedule, 600 transferees of the Jerome relocation center will arrive in Heart Mountain 1:45 p.m., Thursday, Melford O. Anderson, assistant project director, announced.

Induction of incoming Jerome residents will follow the same pattern as was used in receiving the transferees from Tule Lake last fall. The train consisting of seven coaches and two sleepers will arrive at the Vocation siding whence the passengers will walk to the induction station. Police will rope off and patrol the area to prevent confusion.

### Obstacles Remain for Proposed Camping Trips

Community Activities and the project administration have been working together to make it possible for the Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, and the Campfire girls, to conduct their camping activities in Yellowstone Park this summer, according to Marlin Kurtz, CA supervisor. It is hoped that necessary plans can soon be completed, but there remain two major problems for solution, Kurtz said.

The trial of the 63 Heart Mountain residents indicted by the federal grand jury early in March on charges of violating the selective service act started yesterday in the United States district court in Cheyenne, according to word received here.

The case of each of the defendants is being considered separately by United States District Judge T. Blake Kennedy and it was estimated that if the opening day pace continues, the trial may take 10 days. The defendants, all of whom pleaded innocent, waived trial by jury.

The minimum wage paid by the company is 77 cents per hour, but average earnings, after regular job assignments, should run about \$50-\$55 per week, Goode said. Goode indicated that 300 to 400 men are needed. More than 20 nisei are now employed by the company, according to Matsumura.

"Having seen the men at work there, I can highly recommend this offer," said Claud Gilmore, assistant relocation officer, who accompanied the company men here.
