Residents Told They Can Actively Aid Return to California

Residents can actively aid in the restoration of their rights to return to California by asking Caucasian friends in that state to send letters favoring their return to Henry L. Stimson, secretary of war, and John J. McCloy, assistant secretary of war, Washington, D. C.; Maj. Gen. Charles M. Bonesteel, Presidio; San Francisco, Calif.; and Dillon S. Myer, WRA, Washington, D. C., according to the Rev. Herbert V. Nicholson of Pasadena, Calif., who visited the center over the weekend.

"The letters from the Caucasians to the persons listed would be more effective if they will stipulate that they would provide temporary or permanent housing and work for the evacuees and give evidence of community acceptance," the Rev. Nicholson said.

"The feeling in California is changing in your favor. The general public is beginning to see the injustice of keeping you people out when it is no longer a military necessity to do so. However, the war department cannot take action until it has tangible proof in the form of letters that evacuees will be well-treated when they return," he added.

If any resident in Heart Mountain feels hesitant about asking his friends in California to write the letters, the Rev. Donald K. Toriumi will take care of the service if the names are turned in to him at his home at 30-9-F.

Seasonal Farm Work and Railroad Jobs Available at Outside Employment Office

Henry Mitarei, formerly of Heart Mountain who is now farming a large section in truck crops, is requesting through the War Foods administration for 60 seasonal farm workers for the Pacific farms near Richfield, Utah, according to the outside employment office. Prevailing wages will be paid for hourly and piece work. The contract will be from Aug. 15 to Nov. 30. Residents interested in the offer are requested to contact the outside employment office immediately; however, those under 16 years of age and over 60 or any youth who is to return to school are asked not to register.

The SP&S railroad needs 50 men to increase present gang engaged in track labor between Spokane and Pasco, Wash. The crews are under the supervision of Japanese foremen. Base rate of pay is 62¢ per hour for an 8 hour day and time and half for 2 hours overtime daily. Living quarters are provided in outfit cars on line with bunks furnished, but it is preferred that the men bring their own bedding. The charge for board is 50¢ per day with meals prepared by a Japanese cook. Membership in a medical association is optional for \$2.00 per month but applicant must pass a physical examination. Interested persons are to contact the outside employment office.
