Potato Pickers to Leave Thursday for Idaho

Approximately 260 residents, including 30 high school students will leave Thursday by train for potato harvesting in the Idaho Falls, Idaho, area, it was announced by the outside employment office. The train will leave from the Heart Mountain depot sometime after 2 p.m.

Final instructions were issued to the workers as follows; (1) all high school students must be accompanied by chaperones, (2) for purposes of contract distribution, the workers will assemble as groups on train, (3) each piece of baggage must be clearly marked with owner's name and address as well as the name and address of the employer (4) baggages will be picked up beginning at 8 a.m. Thursday, but if they are not picked up by noon, the leaves office should be notified immediately, (5) the baggage car will be sealed and no baggage checks will be issued, (6) leave cards should be picked up as far in advance as possible.
